IOWA MAN IS SHOT DEAD

Masked Murderers Hold Open a Trolley Car in Los Angeles at Night.

Los Angeles, Cal., March 23.—Three masked robbers attempted to hold up a car on the Los Angeles-Pacific electric line, running between Los Angeles and Santa Monica, about a mile west of the city limits, and after a pistol duel between C. W. Henderson, one of the passengers, and one of the robbers, the other two highwaymen began shooting right and left through the car. One passenger was killed and three others were wounded. The dead: H. A. Griswold of Manson, Iowa. The wounded: J. C. Cunningham of Los Angeles, a prominent trunk manufacturer, shot through the left thigh, thigh bone broken, serious; Ellis Peterson, shot through left leg; J. G. Bowles, shot through left leg and left hand. It is believed that one of the robbers was badly wounded. Mr. Griswold was a wealthy citizen of Manson, Iowa. He came here several months ago for the benefit of his mother's health. The holdup occurred at the head of a deep cut. Three men, wearing masks on their faces, sprang from the weeds alongside the track. One boarded the front end of the car and the other two the rear end. The first man commanded the passengers occupying the open seats to put up their hands, and when one of them did not comply, he fired a shot. Henderson then opened fire on the robber shooting as fast as he could pull the trigger. The

Oil and Mining Fakes

Government Will Proceed Against Other Get-Rich-Quick Nuisances.

Washington, March 23.—Another crusade against fraudulent mining and oil concerns will be instituted immediately by the postoffice department. The companies involved in this attack are those which publish alluring advertisements and make representations which manifestly are fraudulent. This crusade by the department undoubtedly will sound the death knell of these companies, which have fattened on the gullible people who give up their money in the hope of securing from 20 to 100 per cent on their investments. Complaint has been received by the postoffice department against some of the copper corporations doing business in Montana. The charge is made that these companies are fraudulent on their faces, making promises impossible to redeem and obtaining money under false pretenses. THE SINFUL SLOT MACHINE. Terre Haute, Ind., March 23.—In most of the Protestant churches yesterday sermons were preached against slot machines. This was in pursuance of a plan adopted by the Terre Haute Ministerial Association whose request of Mayor Streeg to enforce the law was met with refusal. DEAN FARRAR DEAD

A Well-known English Churchman Is Gone.

London, March 23.—Very Rev. Frederick William Farrar, dean of Canterbury since 1895, died yesterday. Dean Farrar was in his seventy-second year. Dean Farrar had long been in delicate health and disabled by creeping paralysis. He latterly had to be carried everywhere and was unable to officiate, although a constant attendant at the Canterbury cathedral service to the last. He was present at some school sports on Saturday afternoon but passed a restless night. His condition became serious Sunday morning and he expired peacefully at 7 o'clock last evening. The Very Rev. Frederick William Farrar has been dean of Canterbury since 1895. He was a son of the Rev. C. F. Farrar, rector of Sidcup Kent, and was born in Bombay in 1831. He was educated in King's College, London; was graduated in 1850 with high rank. For several years he engaged in teaching as an assistant master at Harrow, and he held with great distinction the head mastership of Marlborough college from 1871 to 1876. He preached frequently at Oxford and Cambridge, and was an honorary chaplain to the queen from 1869 to 1873, when he became one of her majesty's chaplains in ordinary. In April, 1876, he was appointed to a canonry in Westminster Abbey, and to the rectory of St. Margaret's, and during the next seven years was more in public life than later when he became dean. He became archdeacon of Westminster in 1883, and seven years later accepted the chaplaincy of the house of commons. After holding that post five years he was appointed dean of Canterbury and in the same year became deputy clerk of the closet of the queen. Dean Farrar was the author of many books of essays, fiction and works on theological subjects. "The Life of Christ" reached the twelfth

MRS. SALMON'S ELOPEMENT

She Ran Away With Her Husband's Brother—Her Boy Caught and Returned.

New York Sun Special Service. Newark, N. J., March 23.—Jesse R. Salmon, the chancery court stenographer, whose wife ran away a week ago with his older brother, Albert, last night met his 12-year-old son who was taken from the couple at Manila, Iowa, by his counsel, W. D. Scott of Sioux Falls. The meeting was not effusive upon the part of the boy, who told his story in a manner which indicated he would rather be with his mother than with his father. He said he had known of the proposed trip for at least four months and that his mother had been preparing for it. He said his mother left Hoboken with him and went to Chicago and from there to Sioux Falls, where they arrived two weeks ago and found a telegram from his father. The uncle's coming changed the plans and they started for Manila to take a trail for the coast. He said that his mother promised to see him again soon, but not in New Jersey and he refused to tell where she said she was going. \$7,000,000 FOR A SCHOOL. Boston, Mass., March 23.—Archie Wentworth, who died in this city last Thursday, left the bulk of his property, estimated to be worth \$7,000,000, to be applied to the foundation and maintenance of an industrial school in Boston. The will was to be considered as it pertained to the estate of Wentworth's daughter, Mrs. Willoughby Stuart, wife of the former British consul in this city.
