CHANGES IN PENSIONS

Details of the New Ratings Are Received by Maj. Oscar Seebach.

Good news for old soldiers has been received by Major Oscar Seebach, assistant adjutant general of the state.

The first increased the rating for total deafness from \$30 to \$40 a month. The second raises the rate for the loss of one hand or one foot from \$30 to \$40 and that for the loss of an arm at or above the elbow or a leg at or above the knee from \$35 to \$45.
