THE FINAL DEBATE

High School Debaters From St. Paul and Fergus Falls Will Meet To-night.

Great Interest in the Event Which Takes Place in the U. of M. Chapel.

To-night at the state university chapel takes place the final event in the liveliest series of interscholastic debates since the Minnesota High School Debating League was organized. The competing teams will represent the St. Paul Central and the Fergus Falls high schools and the win-

ner will receive the handsome silver cup, offered by The Journal, to become the permanent trophy of the school winning it three years in succession. In addition, The Journal awards to each member of the winning team a handsome medal as a personal recognition. The judges to-night will be Congressman-elect John Lind of Minneapolis, Professor William Schaper of the state university, and a third one to be named by President E. E. McDermott of the league and announced immediately after the de-

bate. The subject for the debate will be, "Resolved, that United States senators should be chosen by direct vote of the people." Each team has debated on both sides of this question in the preliminary rounds. In this final discussion St. Paul will have the negative and Fergus Falls the affirmative. St. Paul's team is composed of Paul C. Gauger, Kenneth McMannigal and Henry Horwitz. The last named will take the place of Milton Firestone, who has not yet recovered from a recent severe surgical operation. Fergus Falls will be represented by Charles S. Bayley, Hans A. Hanson and Caleb C. Hogan.

The Fergus Falls contingent came in early this morning, headed by J. A. Vian, superintendent of schools, and J. H. Grass, president of the board of education. Owing to the distance, there was not a large delegation in addition to the team, but Mr. Grass has been informed that the university boys from Fergus Falls and the surrounding counties will take care of the up-state team in the way of "rooting" the attendance of a large and enthusiastic delegation to cheer the St. Paul debaters, the up-state university students have organized to see that the demonstration is by no means one-sided.
