Starving Finns Say Russian Oppression Is Far Worse Than Hunger.

Swedes and Norwegians Form an Organization to Promote International Fraternity.

Heartrending stories of destitution and distress are told by Dr. Louis Kloppsch of the Christian Herald, who has returned from his good Samaritan work in Finland and Sweden. Dr. Kloppsch represented the Finnish famine relief fund, to which charitable Americans contributed close to \$100,000, and his tour included the famine-stricken districts. In which 400,000 unfortunates are still struggling to keep body and soul together with coarse bread as their sole article of food.

THE BROTHER PEOPLE An Organization Formed to Promote Norwegian-Swedish Fraternity. In Christiania there was recently established the Brother People's Welfare, an organization of Swedes and Norwegians to promote the friendly relations between the two countries. The organizations will encourage the foundation of branches all over the United Kingdom and arrange for union meetings of young people's societies, athletic and singing societies, etc. The Norwegian branch has about 600 members and the Swedish members are of about the same number. About sixty delegates from Stockholm attended the Christiania meeting and the new organization, "Broderfolkenes Val," in Swedish and "Broderfolkenes Val" in Norwegian, was auspiciously launched. The proceedings were conducted under the greatest enthusiasm. Among those elected to the executive board were the following Norwegians: Attorney Thorne of Drammen; Lieutenant-Colonel Knoff, General Secretary Martens, Bjorn Bjornson, Hr. Lovenskjold, Editor Gjelstad, Professor Jager, Mrs. Gjersten, Dr. J. C. Holm, General Thaulow, Miss Jorstad, Colonel Vogt and Mrs. Kjaer. To the Swedish section, Candidate Aurelius, Consul General, and Professor E. W. Cronquist, Editor Henrik Hedlund, Professor Franz Lund, Captain Pestin, Messrs. Beckman and Kronlund of the Swedish Elksclub, Captain C. A. Wulff, Justice Staaf, Miss Bath-Holmberg and President Olsson of the labor council in Stockholm. The next general meeting will be held a year hence in Stockholm. The meeting broke up in a three times three cheers for the organization.

JOHN VOLK HONORED His Admirer Friends Tender Him a Birthday Dinner. John Volk, publisher of Nordlyst, had a birthday not long ago and his admiring friends gave him a dinner at the Clarendon hotel in Brooklyn. Volk is now 60 years of age, and has been a marked man in America for forty-three years. He is a journalist of ability, a poet of decided genius, a linguist, a scholar, a brilliant speaker, and a good fellow in the highest meaning of the term. He translates poems from English into Danish.

FINNS FOR ALASKA A West Coast Company Is to Encourage Colonization. The proposition to colonize the agricultural lands of central and southeastern Alaska with Finns at last seems to be on the point of being accomplished, says the San Francisco Enterprise. An organization known as the Alaska Colony company has for a long time been pursuing extensive investigations as to the character of the soil in Alaska, and has established the fact that the soil there is so infinitely superior to the best soil in Finland that those hardy people will find the task of tilling it simple beyond their dreams. Killed a Rowdy. A manslaughter case which is attracting some attention in Sweden is that of Arvid Johansson of Hill parish, near Gefle, who is under arrest for causing the death of Carl Bostrom. The latter was amusing himself by throwing stones thru the windows of the Good Templars' hall, where an entertainment was in progress. Arvid and his brother Simon went out to put a stop to the outrage. Bostrom rushed to attack Simon, when his brother stepped in and struck the former with his fist, knocking him down with such force that Bostrom sustained fatal injuries. The prisoner is but 18 years of age and a most estimable young man. The Charlies Win. A lawsuit over the estate of a Mrs. Borjeson, who died about a year ago, has been decided against her relatives. Her first will disposed of the entire estate to charitable institutions in Sweden, but the second left all her property to King Oscar under conditions. As it could not be found, however, the relatives contended that the property fell to them, as the missing will clearly repealed the former. The Swedish courts would not sustain this position, however, and declared the first will to be valid. Grieg Excites the Bohemians. Edvard Grieg was a lion in Prague.

Swedish Artist in London. B. Kronstrand, a Swedish artist, has attracted considerable attention in London. He had two of his works at a recent art exhibition which attracted much attention—one a portrait of an English statesman and the other a scene at a target practice for cannon—each person being an actual portrait. The latter work was full of action and was conceded to be that of a master. The Youngest City. Lysekile is the youngest city in Sweden. It was granted a charter about a fortnight ago and celebrated the occasion with due pomp. The keys of the city were turned over to Mayor Sunberg who made an address. The festivities closed with a dinner given by the mayor to the functionaries of the new city. Want to Hear Sverdrup. Captain Otto Sverdrup attended a meeting of the Royal Geographical society at London on April 27, on special invitation, to lecture at some length on the results of his three years' explorations north of Greenland. On his way to England he stopped in Copenhagen to fill an engagement to lecture. A Pathetic Tale. Swedish papers are not given to romancing and hence the story of the horse in Warstead which died of sorrow over his master's death must be true. The horse, a favorite animal, was selected to convey the remains of G. Larson to the church yard.
