

### A VICAR DISGRACED

Rev. Mr. Hadden, Who Married the Vanderbilts, Is Practically Excommunicated by Bishop.

Prolonged Cheers Greet the Bishop's Statement Before the London Diocesan Conference.

London, May 1.—Lasting disgrace has fallen upon the Rev. R. H. Hadden, vicar of St. Mark's church, who on Saturday last married Mrs. Rutherford to William K. Vanderbilt, as the result of which he now stands practically excommunicated by the Church of England.

At a meeting last night of the London diocesan conference, presided over by the bishop of London, supported by the bishop of Kensington, the members of the diocesan authorities passed the severest censure upon the clergyman.

In his opening speech the bishop of London said: "My opinion is that the grave scandal has been perpetrated in this diocese (cheers), a far greater scandal than any case of ritual, because it is a moral scandal. This scandal will not be without its use if it makes the whole world aware that I am not responsible for the license issued by my chancellor. I have the strongest objection to the use of the marriage service for any man or woman whose husband is alive. Such remarriage, if contracted at all, should be contracted at a registry office. My view, therefore, is that the clergyman should not celebrate such marriages in their churches." (Prolonged cheers.)

"Nothing would induce me to visit as if nothing had happened a church where such a scandal had taken place until some amends were made to the diocese which had been dishonored by its rector."

The bishop of London expressed gratitude for these brave utterances.

Hempstead, N. Y., May 1.—Bishop Burgess of the Long Island Episcopal diocese does not approve of the marriage of divorced people. He has issued a statement denouncing the Vanderbilt marriage.

He regrets exceedingly the marriage of W. K. Vanderbilt and Mrs. Rutherford by a clergyman of the Church of England. I am firmly opposed to the marriage in the Episcopal church of a divorced person and in my diocese would firmly oppose such marriage. The same conditions exist in all the other dioceses of the United States.

He stated that once persons marry they so remain until death and so it will always remain in the Episcopal church. Efforts will be made at the general convention in Boston next year to settle definitely all matters pertaining to the marriage of divorced people in the Episcopal church. Although this marriage is to be retracted, it will not doubt result in bringing about the next general convention the matter in a more forceful manner.

COTTON VISITS LOUBET.

And the American Fleet Salutes the French President.

Marseilles, May 1.—President Loubet arrived here yesterday from Bizerta, Tunis on board the warship Jeanne D'Arc, and escorted by the French fleet. As the American ship approached the port she was saluted by land batteries and the American warships under the command of Rear Admiral Cote.

As the Jeanne D'Arc entered the roadstead and amidst a cheering throng in a steam launch alongside of the French cruiser.

He was met at the rail by the captain of the vessel, who presented him to Loubet. Admiral Cote greeted the president and expressed the affectionate sentiments of President Roosevelt and the American people toward the government and people of France.

POSTOFFICE SCANDAL IN MANILA.

Manila, May 1.—G. M. Milne, postmaster of Tacloban, capital of the island of Leyte, has been convicted of misappropriating funds, but no sentence has yet been pronounced. Milne is also charged with embezzlement.

Manila.—The town of Marikina, province of Manila, has been destroyed by fire. A thousand houses were burned and the inhabitants are in much distress.

Pittsburgh.—Seven men were burned yesterday by an explosion at furnace D of the Edgar Thomson steel plant of the Carnegie Steel company at Braddock.

Vallejo, Cal.—There has been an epidemic of diphtheria from the navy on this coast for some months past, but now it seems to be beating a record. It is said that 150 men have failed to return to the receiving ship independence since last year. All claim that it is because of the poor and scanty fare.

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### A NEW ANAESTHETIC

Germantown Physician Says That the Finson Rays Will Kill Pain.

Philadelphia, May 1.—A Germantown physician has made the discovery by accident that the so-called Finson rays have valuable anaesthetic properties.

On March 16 he was called upon by a man who was suffering with a wound on the forearm. After cleansing the wound the doctor placed the arm in the violet light of his Minin lamp for the anaesthetic effect of the rays.

When he started to sew up the wound the patient told him that the operation gave him no pain. The physician has since used the rays with equal success in a score of minor operations.
