A POLISH ANNIVERSARY

Poles of Minneapolis Will Celebrate Promulgation of Constitution. Rather more elaborate than usual will be the local celebration Sunday afternoon of the one hundred and twelfth anniversary of the promulgation of the constitution. This year, granted May 3, 1791, by King Stanislaus Poniatowski, is said to have been the first European constitution giving religious freedom. Political privileges were also conferred at the same time upon classes that had previously enjoyed little liberty. The Poles of Minneapolis will take part Sunday afternoon in a procession along a line of march ending at the hall of the Catholic Order of Foresters, Thirtieth avenue NE and Fourth street. Upwards of a thousand men in the parade will represent the St. Anthony society, the Holy Cross society, the Zecota society, the Zjednoczenie Polakow society, the St. Joseph society, and Washington court, Catholic Order of Foresters. The chief speakers during the anniversary exercises will be George Kozlowski and Julius Shumet. Several children will give recitations. Among the selections to be sung by the choir of the Holy Cross Polish Catholic church will be part of Montusko's opera "Halika."
