

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The following resolution endorsing Woman's suffrage unanimously passed both houses of the Wyoming legislature, at its recent session.

Whereas, The question of equal suffrage is being seriously considered in many states of the union; and Whereas, Equal suffrage has been in operation in Wyoming ever since territorial days in 1869, during which time women have exercised the privilege of voting generally and intelligently, with the result that a higher standard of candidates have usually been selected for office; elections have been made peacefully, orderly and dignified; the general character of legislation improved; intelligence in political, civil and social matters greatly increased; and Whereas, Under the responsibilities incident to suffrage, the women of Wyoming have not in any sense been deprived of any of their womanly qualities, but on the contrary the womanhood of Wyoming has developed to a broader usefulness.
