Journal March 24, was made public this morning. The report shows that the sales of "spot" grain for 1902 were about 1,000,000 bushels less than in 1901. The receipts of wheat were 88,762,120 bushels, about 2,000,000 bushels less than in 1901. The receipts of all grain were larger than in any other year except 1901. The arrivals of oats were the largest on record, being about 1,000,000 bushels greater than in 1899. The corn receipts were 4,000,000 bushels less than in 1901. the Journal March 24, was made public 4,000,000 bushels less than in 1901, the falling off being due to the previous small crop harvested in the southwest. Barley receipts exceeded any other year by 3,000,000 bushels and the movement of flax totaled 1,000,000 greater than in any other calendar year in receipts and ship-

For the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1902, the flour shipments were 16,316,343 barrels. as compared with 14.851.464 for 1901. The wheat receipts of the year were 84,381,040.
