WHY HE COULDN'T GET IN

A New Explanation of Gen. Corbin's Rejection by the Metropolitan Club.

New York Sun Special Service. Washington, May 4.—The Philadelphia Press prints what it terms the "inside story" of General Corbin's rejection as a member of the Metropolitan club. It says two enemies of Corbin in the club made effective use of the old story that years ago Corbin worked off a bob-tailed flush for the real thing on another army officer and scooped in a nice pot. The incident is said to have led to a good deal of criticism of Corbin and to the vague phrase, "One of the Corbin kind," in describing a flush that lacked one card of the proper suit. According to the press writer, the story is a lie. There was a game of poker at Schenck's and Corbin was in it. He did not win on a bob-tailed flush but did it fairly in a good bluff. But this is not the true story of the failure of General Corbin to be elected to membership of the Metropolitan club. Some years ago a man named Weightman, a member of the Metropolitan club, managed to secure appointment as secretary of the Vicksburg Park commission with a salary of \$200 a month. The commission has never had a meeting which Weightman attended and his job was therefore a pure sinecure. For years he drew the salary without performing any work. Finally the case was drawn to the attention of Secretary Root, and Mr. Root asked General Corbin to look up the facts. General Corbin did so, reported the result of his inquiries, and Secretary Root

THE ACTIVE KINGS

Edward at Paris and the Kaiser at Rome.

Paris, May 4.—Yesterday was really the day of King Edward's visit to Paris. Practically all it closed his first foreign tour in the capacity of the reigning monarch of Great Britain, for the only item in his program for yesterday was a church service in the morning. Lisbon and Rome served merely as a prelude to Paris, where the real work was to be done. During his tour the king has everywhere effected something real. In Portugal his visit removed the suspicions of that country that England was considering the alienation of the Portuguese South Africa colonies, and at the same time, as has been pointed out in these dispatches, it facilitated statements by which Great Britain can use those same colonies. Then his visits to Gibraltar and Malta were calculated to remind the people of England's position in the Mediterranean. Next came Rome. There the British sovereign had the most enthusiastic welcome of his entire tour. The significance of this is unnecessary to point out. It is mentioned merely to recall Italy's coast line and her navy and the fact that she is part of the triple alliance. Last of all came what in importance should have been the first visit—the trip to Paris. This was the greatest and the unknown quantity. Now that the visit is practically over it is possible to sum up its actual meaning and its potential results. First and foremost, it can be said that beyond question it will make for peace in Europe, for when the story of France and England since the days of the Fashoda incident are recalled, when the bitter feelings one to the other of these two near neighbors at this period are considered—feelings so bitter, indeed, that it is now well known that war was prob-

SHOT THE CHUTE

And John Wolfe Narrowly Escapes Death in Doing It.

New York Sun Special Service. Cooperstown, N. Y., May 4.—There is no danger that John Wolfe will forget his experiences in "shooting the chutes" down the steep side of Mount Iktanyan in Delaware county. The mountain is one of the most commanding peaks in the Catskills. Wolfe, who had been spending the day in mountain climbing, came unexpectedly upon a big trough or chute built down the mountain side and used for carrying wood from the heights down to a point nearly a quarter of a mile away, the lower portion ending about fifteen feet from the ground. Wolfe found a flat stone, placed it in the trough, and seated himself on it. He began his journey by starting gently enough, but in a short distance had gained such speed that he became frightened and clutched in vain at the railings to stop his speed. With torn clothes and bleeding hands he shot with lightning speed down the long trough, out into space, and fell in a heap on the ground. He was unconscious when found, but, although his body was a mass of cuts and bruises, no bones were broken.

ARGENTINE GERMAN ORGANIZE.

New York, May 4.—An association for the protection of Germans and association for the protection of Argentines has been formed here, according to the Herald from Buenos Aires. According to the by-laws, the organization proposes to protect its members in the administration of Argentine laws. If the laws are administered to the prejudice of the members or their relatives the association will defend gratuitously and will endeavor to have the same laws repealed. The action of the German bond is to proceed independently of the German diplomats, whose aid will not be required, and to demand justice from the Argentine authorities.

Rome, May 4.—Emperor William yesterday was received by the pope. He had a conference with the pope of forty minutes' duration, and then returned to the residence of the Prussian minister to the holy see.
