STATE FAIR PLANS

Board of Managers Will Make Room for Popular Features—Popular Band Engaged. Several departments of the state fair will be greatly benefited by the changes arranged for by the executive committee of the board of managers at a meeting held late yesterday afternoon at the office on the grounds. For some years the woman's department has been very much crowded for space. This will be remedied for the coming fair by the abandonment of the woman's building heretofore used and the setting apart of the building formerly used as the agricultural and horticultural building for the uses of the exhibits of the woman's work.

The new woman's building is about 75x150 feet in size, and will provide nearly four times as much space as the old building. It has been thoroughly overhauled and the roof has been put on. The building will now receive attention, and the board voted yesterday to paint the interior throughout and put it in the best of condition. It is then to be turned over to E. F. Nelson and Mrs. Luther, the assistant superintendent, who will make plans for the exhibit of next fall on a much enlarged scale.

Arrangements were also authorized yesterday for the remodeling and enclosing with a glass wall of the old machinery department building, and the building heretofore used as the fish and game department, giving these things more room and at the same time relieving the main building of considerable valuable exhibition space, which will be utilized in caring for manufacturing exhibits.

Among other things done yesterday afternoon was the engagement of the Journal Newsboys' band for Minneapolis day at the coming fair.

"ROOKIES" WON OUT LAND 3 LARGE JOBS

Crew of Recruits Beat Crack Oarsmen of the Cruiser Minneapolis. The Lead in the Business of Elevator Building.

A Full Blood Indian and a Recent Addition to the Crew of the Cruiser. Philadelphia, Gainesville, Texas and Milwaukee Have Just Placed Big Orders Here.

Minneapolis is an inland city, but her namesake, the fast cruiser Minneapolis, gives four city recruits a special interest in the United States navy. The crew is now half League Island navy yard, near Philadelphia, where the routine is not so onerous that the crew cannot indulge in athletic sports in rather elaborate fashion. Last Saturday according to the Philadelphia Ledger, a boat crew of recruits defeated the crack ship's company crew of the cruiser at the League Island yard races, wrestling from it the championship pennant of the navy yard. The ship's company crew consisted of veteran seamen, and held the pennant time out of mind. It made a brave effort to retain the trophy, winning the first heat in fine style against seven competitors, but it had to haul down its colors in the final to the "landlubbers."

Sixteen crews, selected from as many divisions of the Minneapolis jacksies rowed for the pennant. They were numbered from 15 to 30 each, according to their division. The number of each crew thereafter, as agreed with the length of service of its men. It was crew 27 which won, its number indicating that the men were among the last received on the ship.

Two trial heats were rowed, each by eight crews, and the winning crew of the trials were the competitors in the final heat. The ship's company crew had little difficulty in beating off the palms in the first trial heat, and No. 27 was easily successful in the second.

It was the monthly pay day at the navy yard, and the jacksies felt rich in the session of \$15 each. Betting, therefore, was lively. Up to the time of the beginning of the last heat the odds were 1 to 2 on the ship's company crew. The course was a half mile and No. 27 was a half mile in the trial heats the eight rival crews, of ten men each, made an animated picture. The greatest interest, however, lay in the final heat, Nos. 15 and 27. It was nip and tuck from the start to the finish, the recruits winning by half a boat length.

The winning crew was given a seventy-two hours' leave as a reward for the victory. No other event marked Admiral Sigsbee's first day in command of the navy yard.

An Indian Sailor. Among the recruits of the Minneapolis is Great White Bear, a Caribbee Indian. He joined the crew on Friday. He is a Crow, 23 years old, from a Montana reservation, where his father, who is also named Great White Bear, is a farmer.

The young Indian said that his brother served as a cavalier in the regular service during the Spanish-American war. Many Indians are attracted to the navy, he said, by the camp life, while few enter the navy. He hopes the navy to get a taste of sea life and to see the world.

A DRUNKEN MAN'S DEED

Joseph Kohler Shoots and Kills John Carr on the Streets of St. Paul.

John Carr, a young man who resided at Front and Matilda streets, St. Paul, was shot and killed last night by Joseph Kohler. Kohler has been arrested. Kohler, who is a habitual drunkard, had been on a spree for several days, and last night he borrowed from a friend, explaining that he wanted to protect himself from a gang that was bothering him. A short time afterwards he met Carr and three companions on the street. One of the young men spoke to Kohler and in an instant later the drunkard fired the bullet striking Carr in the temple and killing him. Carr was one of the other boys attempted to remonstrate with the man, another shot was fired, but it went wide.

The fatal shot Kohler went to his home, 573 Farrington avenue, where he was found in a drunken stupor by the police. The revolver was found hidden in the bedclothing. He was arrested and taken to the central police station, but has been unable to make a coherent statement of the affair on account of his drunkenness.

Kohler is 23 years of age, married and has five children. Carr was 19 years old and resided with his parents. Both men are plumbers but had never met before last night.

MINNEAPOLIS CONTRACTORS ARE TAKING THE LEAD IN THE BUSINESS OF ELEVATOR BUILDING.

Three large contracts for grain elevator buildings at outside points have just been awarded by Minneapolis contractors in competition against bidders from all parts of the country. The new style tile-tank house, which form of construction is so connected with the city as to be considered almost a Minneapolis institution has caught on. Elevator men the country over are turning to this city and no one any longer thinks erecting an elevator without consulting some of the Minneapolis firms in the construction line.

These tile-tank houses, Minneapolis is to become the world's permanent center for the grain elevator building industry. Already the leader in this line, her prestige is increasing rapidly. Probably twenty-five houses of various sizes are now under construction in different parts of the United States and Canada, the construction of which is directed from here. Of these the largest individual job is at Port Arthur, Ont., where work is under way on the big new house of the Canadian Pacific road.

Philadelphia, Milwaukee and Gainesville, Texas, are the latest points to place orders here for new houses.

The Milwaukee house will be for the Schiltz Brewing company of that city, and will stand in the rear of the Milwaukee plant of the company on Third near Franklin street. It will consist of 23 tanks and will have carrying capacity for 850,000 bushels of barley. The ground is already broken and the foundation is being laid. The Philadelphia house is for the Millert Milling company of that city. Six tile tanks of a capacity of 200,000 bushels will be erected at first and probably more later.

At Gainesville, Texas, the plant of Richardson & Co. will be completely rebuilt and a tile-tank elevator erected at the same time. These three contracts were entered by the Barnett & Record company of Minneapolis.


