



An "edition of lucks," as the fresh-grip called it, is the new Gopher. "The Book of the Class of 1903," seventeenth of the annual volumes, published by the junior class of the state university. Delighted students will be examining this achievement to-morrow. They will find therein all wonders bibliographic that the junior mind has heretofore conceived, together with marvels yet undreamed, together pages more of letter press.

The truly sumptuous volume created by local "royalcrafters" is a quarto of nearly half a thousand pages. It is bound in limp gray "ooze" leather, and is printed upon India tint paper. Well nigh every page is illustrated with small half-tones of coeds and other charming scenes, the full-page plates being half-tone reproductions of original "soft pencil" drawings.

### SHE IS TURNING BLACK


Rochester, N. Y., May 14.—Marion Prosser, aged 5 years, of Otisville, N. Y., has commenced to turn black, and unless something can be done the child will soon be converted into a negro. The skin is becoming covered with black spots as large as a hand, and at the present time the child presents a strange piebald appearance. She suffers no pain. Her parents are both white. Her case is a puzzle to doctors of western New York.

### WARSHIP LAUNCHED

London, May 14.—The Commonwealth, the largest battleship afloat, was launched at Gosport on the Clyde yesterday. She is the first vessel of the British navy to have her ten-inch guns protected by an extended barbette, instead of by casemates. Her other armament consists of four twelve-inch guns, four 9.2-inch guns and twenty-four small guns. The new battleship's speed is to be 18.5 knots per hour and she will carry a crew of 750 men. The Commonwealth is of 16,500 tons displacement and her engines are to be of 18,000 horse power.

### St. Louis—Word has been received from Honolulu that the Hawaiian legislature has passed a bill appropriating \$50,000 for an exhibit at the world's fair, and that the governor has signed the bill.


