### GEORGIA IS INTERESTED

Conviction of Ames Construed as a Good Sign by the Savannah News.

As far away as Georgia keen interest is manifest in the conviction of former Mayor Ames of Minneapolis. The Savannah Morning News thus comments editorially on the outcome of the case: "The conviction of ex-Mayor A. A. Ames of Minneapolis of bribery is a victory for decency and honesty in municipal government. To those at a distance who had been following the Ames case it

seemed a forgone conclusion that the man must be convicted, the evidence against him was so strong and direct; and yet in Minneapolis there was doubt as to the outcome. During his career as mayor, Ames had built up a political machine of much power, and it was thought the politicians he had favored would be able to save him from the consequences of his criminality. But, in the face of an aroused public sentiment, not even the wire-pulling friends of the former mayor were able to save him. He will probably have to serve a term in the penitentiary.

"When the man was brought to trial, realizing the overwhelming weight of the evidence against him, his lawyers entered a plea of 'incipient paresis and insanity'—often the last refuge of a cornered rascal. It was sought to be shown that he was mentally irresponsible. But the plea was too manifestly false; a trick by which to squeeze out of a tight place. The jury would have none of it. Had the jury accepted Ames' plea, the trial would have amounted to a farce, and justice would have been dealt a staggering blow in Minneapolis. The conviction of Ames will have beneficial effect there. It will give courage to those who are trying to weed out the grafters."

### A PRINTER'S BULL

The "Red Oil Can" Law Is Valid After All.

The "red oil can" law is all right after all. It was a mistake of the printer, and not of the enrolling clerk, which put an extra "not" in the printed copy of the law, and made kerosene as well as gasoline a red color. The enrolled copy of the bill deposited with the secretary of state reads all right.

When the fact that a mistake had been made nullifying the bill was published, letters of inquiry began to pour in to an office of the secretary of state, and an investigation was made. The enrolled copy was compared with the printed law, and it was found that the printer had slipped the extra "not" into the latter copy, which made it require kerosene cans as well as gasoline to be colored red. The proper correction will be made in the bound volumes of the session laws.

The law goes into effect July 1. It requires the can or container in which gasoline or benzine is sold to be colored red, and makes it a misdemeanor to sell kerosene in red package. The law does not apply to barrels, but to quantities of from one pint to six gallons.

### TURE NOTES

Lawrence Barry, the steeplechase jockey, who was thrown in the Kickerbocker hurdle handicap at Morris Park on Wednesday, was still unconscious at Fordham hospital, New York, yesterday. Dr. Jackson Campbell, who is in charge of the case, said that Barry was suffering from a compound fracture of the skull there was a slight chance of recovery.

R. T. Wilson, Jr., six colt, Mexican, pulled up bleeding from the nostril at the end of a show gallop yesterday at New York in company with Carbuncle. The first half-mile was covered in fifty seconds. The colt may not start in the Withers stake Saturday. Upon examination by a veterinarian, the statement was given out that the bleeding which followed Mexican's work came from a small blood vessel in the nostrils.

It is officially announced that the horse, Good Morning II, has been declared out of the Suburban.


