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A SLIPPERY CUSTOMER, HE

Fred L. Denny, Now Under Arrest Here, Has a Record for Escapes.

Fred L. Denny, a well known crook, was arraigned in municipal court this morning charged with the theft of a "slippery customer."

Denny was arrested Monday night by Detective H. H. Derrick of the South Star police station, who found the man on the street trying to dispose of four watches, which he admitted having stolen.

Denny was arrested last fall at Aurora, Neb., charged with breaking into a freight car. He broke jail and came to Minneapolis where he was afterwards arrested by Detective H. H. Derrick and turned over to the Nebraska sheriff.

While on the way back to Nebraska, the sheriff went to sleep, leaving Denny hand-cuffed and shackled to his side. When he awakened, the seat was empty and a search of the train showed that the prisoner had escaped. He had managed to slip out of the shackles and had jumped from the rapidly moving train.

Denny was afterwards arrested in Iowa and was again returned to the Nebraska sheriff's custody in the meantime the evidence against him at that place was lost and the indictment nolleed. He then returned to this city where his parents live and has kept quiet until he stole the watches.

MORE PHONE EXTENSIONS

A New \$6,000,000 Company to Cooperate With Twin City.

Articles of incorporation which have been filed at Augusta, Me., by E. H. Moulton of Minneapolis, provide for a tri-state telephone and telegraph company with a capital stock of \$6,000,000.

The company will construct extensions of the Twin City Telephone company's lines thru North and South Dakota and Minnesota. There will also be extensions into Wisconsin.

The organization of the Tri-State company is one part of a comprehensive plan to cover the entire territory tributary to the twin cities with lines. The company will establish as thoro a system in the long distance field as that which the Twin City company has in the Minneapolis and St. Paul.

The Twin City company already has connections with the Consolidated Telephone and Telegraph company, to Duluth and Superior and with the Minnesota Valley Telegraph company to Mankato. It has connections also with the Rapid Service Telephone and Telegraph company, at which now runs a line to Hastings, but which will be extended to Hastings and to La Crosse, Wis.

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A REGULAR DARE-DEVIL

Prof. Quickstep's Friends Trying to Dissuade Him From a Perilous Feat.

A hazardous feat will be attempted in Minneapolis at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon. The hero of the occasion, according to a letter received by the Journal, will be Professor Eli Quickstep, of Hartford, whose name is associated with experiments in the defying of fate.

It was Professor Quickstep that first "hooped the loop" at Coney Island. It was he that rode down the steps inside the Bunker Hill monument on a bicycle without handle bars. He not only swam the English channel in 1891, but he also succeeded two years later, in swimming the Niagara river against the current and just above the falls.

The professor has therefore undertaken to ride out Park avenue on a bicycle from Tenth to Twenty-eighth streets. If he succeeds the reward said to be awaiting him is a purse of \$10,000. If he perishes miserably, as many of his friends fear, his obsequies will be worthy of his fate.

Persons desiring to witness the hair-raising ride are cautioned not to crowd too closely along the curbline of the lofty bluff overlooking the river. In view of the fact that this thoroughfare has been so long practically closed to the public announcement is made that Park avenue may be safely approached from the east or the west sides or by way of Tenth or Twenty-eighth streets.

Conservative residents along the avenue, familiar with the temper that the professor must encounter, are urging Mayor Hynes to prohibit the exhibition as "brutal and inhuman." But the professor himself laughs and declares unshaken confidence that he will survive the ordeal.
