LOOKING INTO CREAMERIES

Dairy and Food Department Inspectors Report a High Standard of Excellence.

Inspections by employees of the dairy and food department show a fine standard of excellence at the creameries of the state. A. D. White, who has been giving instructions in the use of commercial starters, says 50 per cent of the butter makers of the state use it, and that it adds 5 points to the value of butter. F. K. Slater inspected nine creameries in Faribault county, supplied by 7,150 cows. The milk tests ran from 3.7 to 3.91 per cent, and the cream tests from 24 per cent up. F. Threshbury visited twelve creameries in Chicago county, supplied by 4,945 cows. The milk tested from 3.5 to 4.4 per cent of fat.

BIDS RECEIVED MONDAY

\$280,000 Bond Issue for the Courthouse is Expected to Sell Well.

Proposals for the bonds authorized by the board of courthouse and city hall commissioners will be received at the commissioners' office in the courthouse Monday afternoon. The issue amounts to \$280,000. The commissioners expect that there will be several bids as the bonds draw 4 per cent interest and the first ones will not be payable for fifteen years. When the bonds are sold active work on the main entrance and the interior of the tower will begin at once.
