Millers Win Again From Columbus by Hitting Preacher Crabbil at Will.

Salisbury, the New Twirler, Starts Off Well, but Weakens in the Fourth.

With seventh place in easy halting distance yesterday afternoon, the millers resumed operations against the would-be-disgrace-not-let-the-pennant-bunch from Columbus, just where they had left off the day before.

GOPHERS IN DEMAND

Minnesota Relay Men Will Run for Milwaukee Club at A. A. U. Championships.

W. H. Linginger, chairman of the athletic committee of the Milwaukee Athletic club, has received word from Coach Williams, of the University of Minnesota, notifying him that Bockman, the crack hurdler of the gopher team, has been injured in practice and that he will be unable to compete in the next meet nor the A. A. U. championships at Detroit on June 6.

Also the M. A. C. track team has been badly crippled thru injuries to different members. Linginger, is getting together a strong team for the A. A. U. meet at Detroit on June 6. A number of new athletes have been added to the team.

The track meet of the Minnesota athletic conference on Laird field at Northfield, yesterday afternoon, was won by Carleton by the narrow margin of one and one-half points. The score was Carleton 47, Hamline 45 1/2, Shattuck 31 1/2.

A big number of records were broken during the meet. Winters, of Hamline, lowered the half-mile mark from 2:10.5 to 2:07. Rooney, of Carleton, raised the high jump record an inch and a half, setting it at 5 feet 5 1/2 inches.

Spaulding, of Hamline, lengthened the discus throw from 31 feet 5 inches to 108 feet 9 inches. Jacobson, of Carleton, raised the pole vault record from 8 feet 10 inches to 10 feet; Rooney, of Carleton, ran the eight hurdles in 16.5, clipping two-fifths of a second off the old record.

ROOT TO MEET GARDNER

Light Heavyweights Will Clash July 5 Before the Douglas Club of Arizona.

In all probability Jack Root and George Gardner, the leading bidders for the light heavyweight championship title, will be matched to fight to a finish before the Douglas Amusement Athletic club of Douglas, Arizona, on July 5.

The details of the articles of agreement from Matchmaker Harry McCoy of the club arrived in Chicago and, with a few alterations, were accepted by Managers Andrew Craig and Louis M. Houseman for Gardner and Root. As soon as the forfeits are posted Gardner will leave for El Paso, Texas, and Root will go to Douglas, where the men will train for the fight.

At the National Sporting Club in London last night, Jack Palmer of Newcastle met "Twin" Sullivan of Boston, Mass., in a contest for the middleweight championship of England and \$1,500. The American made a fine stand, but the men are so evenly matched that at the close of the fifteenth round the referee decided the fight a draw.

Young Corbett will not go to England in July next as he contemplated. Instead, he will remain in this country and do all of his fighting here. It was the champion's intention to go to England and see Ben Jordan personally about securing a bout, but as Jordan had represented at a meeting this week for the purpose of arranging the mill, Corbett will remain in America. Corbett has planned to engage in two six-round bouts at Philadelphia before he goes to the country for a rest. He has offered to meet any featherweight in the business, provided he secures good enough inducements.
