MUSICAL RECITAL.

Miss Frances Vincent. One of the pleasant features of a large week was the recital of Miss Frances Vincent, soprano, at Johnson hall last evening. Many of the friends of the young singer were present as well as many of the younger musicians, and the hall was well filled. The audience was excessively demonstrative, and Miss Vincent was the recipient of many flowers. She was assisted by Miss Frances Horgan, contralto; Mr. Ayers, baritone, and Carlo Fischer, cellist. The program at the Babcock at the Miss Vincent's numbers were all of the ballad type, including two English songs, Mendelssohn's "Wings of Song," Grieg's "The Solitude of a Lark" and Handel's "Mignon." Miss Vincent excels in this type of song, and acquitted herself last night with credit. Her voice is naturally sympathetic, and she is wise and natural in her manner, indeed, she almost makes the mistake, rare in a young singer, of being too familiar with her audience. Her encore song, "The Love of Summer," was very effective, especially in the pianissimo. There is danger in acquiring fluency lest she impair to some extent the beautiful sweetness her voice now possesses.

MISS FRANCES HORGAN, CONTRALTO.

Miss Frances Horgan, contralto, sang Backus's "Springtime" well. Her voice, while not powerful, is of an excellent medium to illustrate the abilities of the young singer. Mr. Fischer did himself no more than justice by his playing, but he was awarded the usual encomiums. Mr. Ayers sang two baritone solos acceptably. Mrs. Babcock played the evening's accompaniments with more than her usual effectiveness.

MISS HELEN LOIS CURRIER.

A young player of great promise and of unusual vocal performance is Miss Helen Lois Currier, a pupil of Sophie M. De Vold who gave a recital at the Unitarian church last evening, assisted by her teacher, in vocal solos, which were well received as an accompanist.

Miss Currier's program was an ambitious one for so young a player, and she acquitted herself to great credit, for the success with which she carried it through, playing entirely without notes. Mozart's "C Major Sonata" formed the opening number, and although she is but a young girl, she played the young player conquered that successfully, and once launched, played serenely thru to the end. Three Chopin numbers followed, all played with precision, but necessary of course without the requisite strength or variety of tone production. Two of Mendelssohn's "Songs Without Words" and a Beethoven "Sonata," the latter the most difficult thing of the evening, completed the program. Miss Currier was the happy recipient of many congratulations, and carried home literally an armful of bouquets.
