TO DO UNIQUE WORK

The United Brethren Will Preach the Gospel of Attractive Homes.

Other Churches Co-operate to Set the New Institution on Its Feet.

The first United Brethren church in Minneapolis, the Maple Hill church, at 638 Fillmore street NE, will be opened Sunday at 8 p. m. The work will be institutional. Among those who contribute to it is a large triangle, without church privileges, lying between the Great Northern and the St. Louis tracks, which is now occupied by the old Pierce school building and is about a mile from any other house of worship. Rev. S. E. Shull, who came last winter from Dayton, O., where he had been engaged in similar work for the Presbyterians, has been wonderfully successful. His earnestness aided him in enlisting the business men of the East Side who gave liberally of money and materials for remodeling the school. Many have given manual labor. Among those who contributed from \$25 to \$10 were W. J. Burnett, C. M. Way, G. H. Elwell, the North-Western, D. M. Witmer, G. H. Tennant, Miss M. D. La Rue, the Congo Congregational church attended to the paper-hanging and others contributed to the painting. The pastor of the new church said to-day: 'It has been our purpose to select a field not already covered. We hope to do among the boys and girls and among the fathers and mothers. We intend to do industrial work such as sloyd and landscape gardening, and to lend a hand in cleaning up the premises, such as putting in flowers, vines, etc., and to improve the lawns.' The old Pierce school has been entirely changed, painted inside and out, papered, fitted with sanitary plumbing and gas, and put in excellent shape. The lower part is reserved for settlement of the reading rooms, social rooms and pastor's parsonage. The upper part has been fitted with hardwood floors and will seat at least 300, while the primary room will accommodate about 75. The organization of the church is being effected and a week from Sunday at 3 p. m., the Sunday school will be organized.

PAPER FROM SHAVINGS

New and Interesting Yellow Fine Product From Texas.

W. L. Longfellow of Orange, Texas, has sent The Journal some fine samples of paper made from yellow pine shavings in that city. Mr. Longfellow reports that the Orange product is the first paper ever manufactured from yellow pine shavings. The shavings have proved such excellent material for paper pulp that the paper mill at Orange is running day and night with a force of eighty-five men. The samples are of a very superior quality of wrapping paper, of red, green, purple, yellow and orange colors and include two tasty blue menu cards of a banquet given by the citizens of Orange to the Travelers' Protective Association. The paper seems to be fully up to the grade that ordinarily encountered and suggests the possibility of using white pine shavings for a like purpose, in which case Minneapolis saw and paper mills should be interested.

The Volunteers of America are trying to raise funds to purchase the house at 206 Second Avenue SE, to be used as a home for friendless girls who come to the city. The great need of such a place has recently been brought to the attention of the Volunteers and they have interested in it. There is an opportunity to obtain the property for \$2,100, and it is hoped that the sum will be raised at once. It was suggested at first that the Dunsen property on Tenth street S be purchased, but it was more expensive than was deemed advisable.

There are many girls who come to the city to find work as domestics or in factories whose very ignorance leads them into danger and the Helping Hand Home will be opened to give them protection and safe shelter. If they are able they will be expected to pay a small sum for their board and in this way it is hoped that the home will be partially self-supporting, also no one will be turned away for lack of money.

JAIL CASES CLEANED UP

There Are Now Practically No Prisoners Awaiting Trial—Sentences Pronounced.

Judge Elliott this morning tempered justice with mercy in the shape of reformatory sentences. Of five prisoners all convicted of grand larceny, three were sent to the reformatory, one given a suspended sentence and one judgment suspended, while the fifth, an ex-convict, was given a term in the penitentiary.

Frieda Francis, who pleaded guilty to grand larceny, was sentenced to the reformatory. Judgment was suspended for four months and the defendant ordered to report to the probation officer.

Mary Ellis, convicted of grand larceny, helped bringing \$20 from the pocket of George Temeras, was sentenced to the reformatory. Her attorney gave notice of a motion for a new trial.

William A. Woodcock, accused of assault in the second degree upon Daniel Egan, is on trial before Judge Elliott. This, with the exception of the case against Thomas Turner, the alleged burglar, is the last indictment to be dealt with this term.

The jail is now free of prisoners waiting trial and the calendar cleaned up. The court calendar will be clear by Tuesday of next week and by next Saturday the jury cases will all have been disposed of and the term's work will be complete.

He Shot an Officer.

John Mannarino, one of the five men accused of attempting the life of Officer William A. Woodcock, was sentenced to four years in the penitentiary. Mannarino is said to have fired the first shot at the scene of the attack upon the patrolman. The other four members of the party will be tried later.

Mary Ellis Convicted.

Mary Ellis, a young colored woman, charged with stealing \$20 from the person of George Temeras, was found guilty of grand larceny in the first degree yesterday afternoon. She was remanded for sentence. As a separator of men and money, the defendant was shown to be the real thing and her methods entirely up-to-date.

DISEASE MORE SEVERE

Smallpox Taking On a More Serious Form, Says Board of Health Secretary.

Four deaths from smallpox out of a total of 14 cases in the state are reported by Secretary Bracken of the Minnesota board of health for the week ending May 25. Although the percentage of mortality still small, it is much greater now than when smallpox first became prevalent a few years ago. The type of the disease is gradually becoming more severe.

The average number of cases last week—fourteen—were at Worthington, Nobles county. In St. Paul eleven cases were reported and two deaths; in Minneapolis, eleven cases; at Staples, six cases and one death; at White Bear, five cases. The fourth death took place at Iona in Staples county.

At Hibbing, eighteen cases there have already resulted in five deaths—a mortality of 28 per cent. Ed Dr. Bracken, who last evening returned from Hibbing, does not believe that the disease will spread. All the cases are confined to two buildings.

FIFTY-FOUR-HOUR WEEK

Basis of Settlement of the St. Paul Foundrymen's Strike.

The national arbitration committee of the Foundrymen's association and the Foundrymen's union of North America, which has been considering the differences between St. Paul employers and employees, last evening, after a long session, reached an agreement at the West hotel by the men were granted by independent and association foundries alike, the terms of settlement being a fifty-four instead of a fifty-six hour week. The erroneous impression had gone forth that the men were to be conceded a nine-hour day with ten hours' pay at 30 cents an hour.

The St. Paul molders were in secret session at Federation hall when word was received from Minneapolis that an amicable settlement had been reached. All were prepared to go to work this morning. They were jubilant over their victory.

THE LAW TOO BROAD

New Act Relating to Improvement Appropriations Covers Too Much Ground.

County Auditor Scott claims to have discovered, upon investigating the new law pertaining to appropriations for internal improvements, that certain flaws render it unconstitutional. It contains more than one subject in its title. It provides for appropriations, and also empowers towns and villages to borrow money and issue certificates of indebtedness. Hennepin county is mentioned only in one paragraph, which provides that \$1,200 shall be turned over to E. B. Saunders and W. S. Dickey for the building of a bridge across the outlet from Brown's bay, between Mud lake and the Bay, Minnetonka.
