CAPT. WHITNEY'S PASS He Receives a Historic Permit to Traverse Washington.

While Captain C. C. Whitney was in Washington last week with the Minnesota editorial party a letter from his son in Marshall, Minn., recalled a vivid former experience in Washington thirty-nine years before.

While looking thru some papers, Frank Whitney found an old document which he made his father, suggesting that it was back in Washington, he might need it.

It was an old pass issued by the provost marshal to the party of volunteers thru the town on the way to Alexandria.

In Response to an Urgent Appeal From Topeka for Laborers. Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Plummer, Once Arrested in Minneapolis While Fleeing From Justice.

Twin city west bound traffic is not much affected by the Kansas and Nebraska floods. At the local offices there was no difficulty in buying tickets to such points as Topeka and Des Moines, except in one case, where the request was refused.

The Rock Island, the Union Pacific, Santa Fe and Burlington are chiefly affected, because their tracks run thru the heart of North Topeka.

A request came from headquarters today for 100 laboring men for Topeka. These were gathered rapidly by the employment agencies and will ship to-night.
