NEW R. F. D. ROUTES

Twelve Will Be Opened in Chisago County This Summer, Making Twenty-four in All.

Twelve new routes for the rural free delivery of mails will be opened in Chisago county this summer. Maps of the proposed routes are now being prepared by W. J. Munroe, special agent of the post-office department. He drives over the county, examines the terrain and gathers information in such detail that he is enabled to indicate, on the map of each rural route the exact position of every farm-house, village and dwelling to which mail will be delivered. There are twelve rural routes already established in Chisago county. When the twelve new routes have been added no resident of the county will be obliged to travel a mile from wife and freddie in order to meet his neighbor at the postoffice.

Characterizes an Attractive Book Issued by the Minnesota & International.

With the opening of the fishing season comes the information that the bass up around Leech Lake are fairly beside themselves with impatience to take the angler's hook. A SPLENDID SUCCESS NORTHWEST IS IT

Benefit for the Kishinef Sufferers J. H. Haslam Returns From Long Trip, to Sing the Northwest's Praises.

Boys Fairly Outdid Themselves Both in Playing and in Financial Results.

He Predicts a Tremendous Wheat Yield for the New Canadian Wheat Fields.

One of the largest credit marks ever won by that organization was carried by the Journal Newsboys' band yesterday afternoon when it gave a brilliantly successful concert at the Lyceum theater for the benefit of the suffering Hebrew survivors of the great massacre. It was a big audience that greeted the boys at the Lyceum and the pleasure of the occasion was materially augmented by the thought of the great disaster which originated with the band members themselves. Several of the boys are of Hebrew origin—some of them even being from Kishinef—and the news of the Russian atrocities was not two days old before the band as a whole had voted to give a benefit and had offered its services to the local relief committee. A fine program was prepared by Professor C. C. Helitzman, director of the band, rehearsals were taken up with characteristic enthusiasm, their services readily agreed to give their services and committee members, band boys and policemen pushed the ticket sales vigorously. As a result of it all sales merit were "Fras" more than receive between \$800 and \$1,000 from the happy inspiration and enthusiastic work of the "big band of little men."

An Artistic Success. The concert was a great success from every point of view. In the first place there is not another organization in the city which could compare with the band, and its playing is simply wonderful when one takes into consideration the youth of its members. Encore after encore greeted its rendition of different numbers on the program, and the success of the concert prevented many of them being acknowledged. The program opened with the "E. I. A. B." march by Hall which played that spirit and dash and which called for a Sousa melody as an encore. Other numbers on the program which were of more than usual merit were "Fras" more than receive by Auber, and Mason's paraphrase "Religioso."

Two especially interesting numbers were Strong's "Air and Variations" for a clarinet solo and accompanying piano and a "Fantasia" from Wallace's "Mariana," introducing a baritone horn solo. In the former number the solo was rendered by Miss E. E. Schmitt, a young girl, born in the very city whose refugees it was desired by this concert to assist. Roskha's playing was a little short of the mark, but his playing was without flaw and was sufficient to attract him to a place in almost any band. Although both numbers were encored, the boys did not respond in person, modestly permitting the conductor to take the praise meant for them alone.

Work of Assisting Soloists. The first of the assisting soloists was Mrs. Vera Leavitt Latham, who sang Donizetti's "Daughter of the Regiment" with fine effect. Mrs. Latham was in perfect voice and she lavishly displayed in this beautiful number. As an encore she sang one of Arditi's waltz songs, "Se Saron Rose," made famous by Meib's rendition in the city. Mrs. Latham's accompaniment was fine and her practical work along this line has been a leading factor in the organization of the large industrial combinations of the present day.

"The Blue and the Gray" was yesterday morning's subject at the People's church in the Masonic Temple. G. L. Morrill delivered the address, a patriotic sermon, which was enlivened by a short sketch of Mr. Morrill's recent trip to Kentucky. The speaker told of Kentucky's beauty of scenery, the generosity of its people, loyalty of its brave men to the right as far as the fact of the war, and would gladly unite with the north at the moment's notice to erect a new statue of liberty more beautiful than Athens and more lasting than the pyramids.

New Organization, Maple Hill United Brethren Church, Formally Begins Its Work.

Maple Hill church of the United Brethren, 638 Fillmore street NE, was formally opened last night. A large audience filled the sanctuary, and the pastor, Rev. S. E. Small, and of the future parishioners, was successfully launched. Music was provided by the choir, and the Congregational church choir and individually by Miss Pettit and Miss Hammond. Rev. W. H. Wolcott of Des Moines made the address. Other speakers were Rev. J. M. Hulbert, pastor of the Avenue Congregational church, and Mrs. G. D. La Rue, principal of the Pierce school.

THE SLEEPER WOKE Trolley Car Passenger Furnishes a Laugh for a Car Full.

For about five minutes yesterday a conductor on a Plymouth and Blossom car was "hopping mad." Just before the car reached First avenue N on its return trip from Plymouth the bell over the motor car was rung and the conductor in duty bound stepped the car at the crossing, but no one got out. The conductor gave the signal to go ahead, and just at that moment the bell began again and continued ringing until the car stopped at Hennepin avenue. While it was still banging away the conductor walked up and down the aisle, but could discover no one's finger on a button. At last, just as the car pulled across Nicollet avenue, he located the cause of the trouble. A gray bearded fisherman equipped with a home-made jointed pole, and the sections being unusually long, had somewhere up the line entered the car, seated himself near the front end of the car, and had attempted to go to sleep. His pole lay over his knee and pointed toward the window, but when he moved, as he did several times, the longest joint touched the push button and so long as he remained in a position that kept it there, the bell rang.

When the conductor aroused the owner of the pole, he discovered that he had gone two blocks farther than he should and immediately rushed for the door, followed by a hearty laugh in which the conductor joined.
