Protege of Windom. The young Norwegian attracted the attention of William Windom, through whose influence he was appointed a special agent in the pension bureau.

At the beginning of the first McKinley administration, back in 1897, Joseph L. Bristow was made fourth assistant postmaster general.

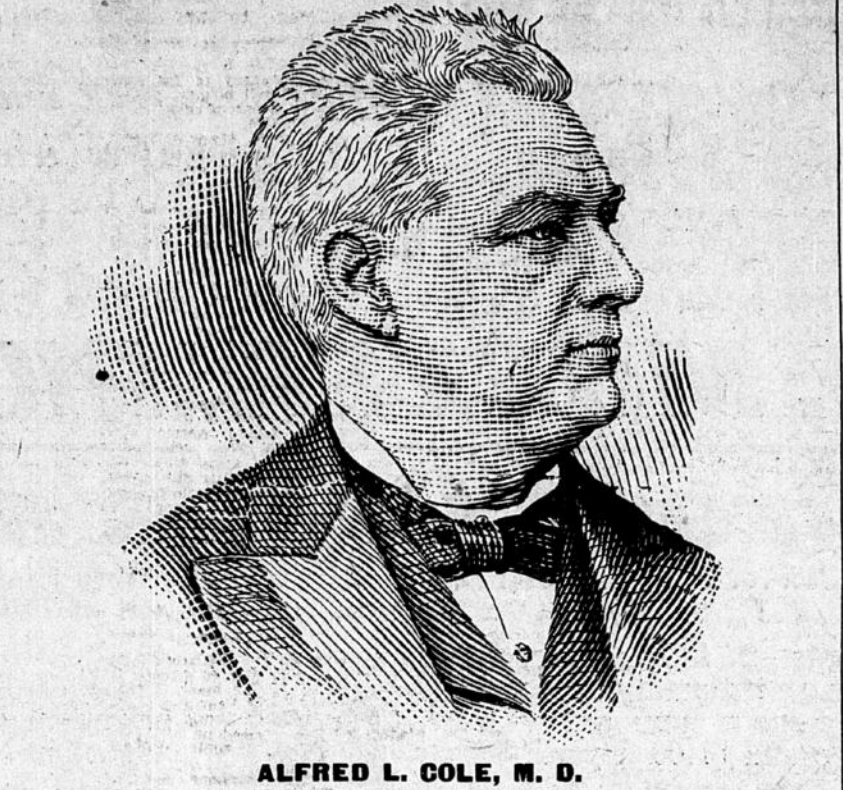

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF LAKEVIEW LAND AND IMPROVEMENT COMPANY. For the purpose of forming a corporation under the provisions of the laws of the State of Minnesota, the undersigned, being of legal age and sound mind, hereby adopt and sign the following:

ARTICLE I. The name of the corporation shall be Lakeview Land and Improvement Company. The general nature of its business shall be to buy, lease, hold, sell, develop, improve, real estate, and to engage in and conduct any and all kinds of mercantile business; to make, buy and sell any and all kinds of loans and securities; and to do and perform any and all acts essential or incidental to such business.

ARTICLE II. The time of the commencement of this corporation shall be June 12th, 1903, and the period of the continuance thereof shall be thirty (30) years.

ARTICLE III. The capital stock of this corporation shall be One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000), to be paid for from time to time as the Board of Directors shall determine.

ARTICLE IV. The names and places of residence of the persons forming this corporation are as follows: Isaac Hazlett, Wm. A. Lancaster, Rufus L. Hardy, of Minneapolis, Minnesota; and R. L. Hardy, of Parkers Prairie, Minnesota.
