The class of '03 of the Minneapolis Central high school was graduated last evening. The weather was ideal for such exercises, and the Swedish Tabernacle in which the commencement was held was crowded with high school students and the friends and relatives of those who were given diplomas. The room had been beautifully decorated for the occasion, and when the members of the class accom-

Miss Blackmer read a poetic essay on "The Religion of Fiction to Life." Walter L. Badger's subject was "The Commercial Supremacy of America."

Do we realize these high ideals? How can we? We have not yet attained to a perfect system of education, the school hours do not operate the system are not yet perfect managers of this high trust. To realize the ideal would require not only perfect teachers, but perfect pupils, no means discouraged or disheartened, for we are breaking the old bands of superstition and ignorance and making constant progress in the direction of the ideal.

Educational ideas that have no eyes, nor ears, nor hands, nor feet to see and hear and feel and run in the ways of real life in this modern world are too antiquated for the twentieth century.

Let us beware of the spirit that would crowd into a corner the essential elements of the true education and bring into prominence those things which are more ornamental than necessary. Education in a republic must be universal. The safety of this government is assured in proportion to the general dissemination of knowledge and the virtuousness of the people.
