

MINNESOTA IS PROUD OF SHATTUCK SCHOOL

Exercises of the Thirty-eighth Commencement of the Faribault Institution Are in Progress—First Honors Won by a North Dakota Boy—What This Famous School Is and Aims to Be—Its Advantages in Preparatory Work.

The thirty-eighth commencement of Shattuck school at Faribault began on Sunday with a sermon by Rev. Irving P. Johnson, rector of St. Paul's parish, Minneapolis, followed by the annual competition drill to-day and the address to the graduating class to be delivered by Rev. Dr. Cuthbert, rector of St. Paul's parish, Des Moines, on Thursday.

who has just inspected it by orders from the war department; but it is not at the expense of time which should be given to intellectual work and its acquirement does not take the place of the personal, moral influence and training which are indispensable to the right development of the best qualities in a boy's nature.

Shattuck is a school of which Minnesota may well be proud. It is recognized the country over as one of the great schools for the training of boys. It has the finest equipment, the highest reputation with the universities, and is the most widely known of all the schools of its class in the west.

There are advantages in a boy preparing for college in such a school which the day school cannot give him. Many can be pointed out who have been saved from failure in their intellectual work by the more systematic thorough application that can be taught a boy in the school he lives in, and by the greater personal help and direction he receives from his instructors in consequence of the very much smaller classes.

Its organization embraces a military department, and yet its managers do not call it a "military school." Its object is not to ape the West Point military academy, nor to make soldiers, but men, with such knowledge of military tactics and principles as will be of value to them and their country in case of need, and the physical training and culture that its methodical exercise gives better than any other system.

An institutional life, too, is of the greatest value and efficiency in molding and developing the manly side of a boy's nature. In his book, "How I Was Educated," Edward Everett Hale said: "Half the benefit of college education is in the lessons learned in getting on with more than the young man in his college. He is at a more impressive age; he learns and absorbs more by the intimate relation in which he lives with his teachers; he elbowed his way with others, his equals, and makes his place among them by his own exertions and merit. The result is a more rapid maturing of his nature, a greater independence of character, and a better knowledge of himself and of others.

It is a most gratifying record. The training develops a forcefulness of character by which these men work up to positions of independence and trust much more rapidly than men of the same average ability who have not had this training.

Each year is adding to the number of men in all walks of life who have been prepared by it for their life's work. By their numbers and their character and ability they will play a more and more important part in moulding the rapidly increasing mixed population of the trans-Mississippi states. With the erection of the buildings still necessary for the completion of its plans, and the endowment for the betterment of its work, its usefulness will be indefinitely increased, and its influence be felt more and more widely.

CLERGYMAN IN COURT

"Rev." Albert Dahlstrom Appeals From Justice Court Sentence.

"Rev." Albert Dahlstrom of Pine Lake, Minn., who has filed an appeal in the supreme court at St. Paul against the sentence of a justice court at Pine Lake, is said to have led a career more spirited than clerical. Mr. Dahlstrom was fined \$5 and costs for disturbing the congregation before which he was preaching at Pine Lake when he interrupted the argument and declared that Christ is not God, but the Son of God.

The appellant is believed to be identical with an Albert Dahlstrom who held religious meetings a year or two ago in a hall on Payne avenue, St. Paul. This Dahlstrom made many converts, but his utterances at the time of McKinley's assassination brought him into acute disfavor. He left, and several weeks later his resignation, received by mail, explained that he felt constrained to withdraw, owing to a painful lack of harmony.
