Scuffed at Britain. A newspaper here makes scathing allusions to Great Britain's moral attitude respecting the assassination. It says: "It is a pity that a country so enlightened and so liberal has failed to see the purpose of late events for what they are."

CONVICTS MAKE RUN FOR LIBERTY

HYSTERICIS FOLLOW SHERIFF'S SEIZURES

That Official Makes Good His Threat to Levy on Effects of Personal Property Tax Delinquents.
