D. A. Nicholson, St. Peter, Minn.—The section of the baseball rules covering the point stated follows: One run shall be scored every time a base runner, after having legally touched the first three bases, shall touch the home base before three men are out. (Exception) If the third man is forced out, or is put out before reaching first base, a run shall not be scored.

The batter, failing to touch first on his hit, cannot be held to have reached the base, consequently the run scored from third base does not count.
