Pratt Institute Graduate Mrs. Cameron Worked Under Dow and Froelich in Normal Art Course.

Mrs. Barnes Cameron who has graduated from the Pratt Institute of Normal Art and Manual Training of Pratt Institute, Mrs. Cameron, who was an artist doing excellent work in water colors and ceramics before going to Brooklyn, has spent two years in the institute perfecting herself for public school work.

Among the leading instructors in art in the school is Arthur N. Dow whose adoption of Japanese art principles to school-room work has transformed the art instruction of the public schools within a few years. Mr. Dow will leave for Japan after his summer school closes at Ipswich and will remain for a year but will return to the institute in spite of reports to the contrary. Mr. Dow has visited and lectured in Minneapolis and is known to many here. Hugo Froelich, his pupil and associate, leaves the institute this year to look after the New York interests of the Prang company and it is with Mr. Froelich that Miss Bonnie Snow of Minneapolis will work next year on school material. Mr. Froelich spent one summer in Minneapolis teaching a summer class of teachers. This summer he is teaching design in a large summer art school at Chautauque.

Among the 3,000 pupils in the institute Mrs. Cameron found westerners predominating. The school is like a colony and has a distinct and pleasant life of its own, altho the social life differs in the various classes and departments. Miss Grace Cosgrove of Le Sueur was a graduate this year and Miss Sarah Farnham Sherman, a former Minneapolis young woman who is now visiting here, was graduated last year and has been teaching in Pittsburg.
