

ARE NEGROES INCREASING? Vital Statistics Throat the South Are Woefully Deficient and of Little Use.

In Charleston, However, the Figures Show a High Death Rate Among the Blacks.

Chicago, July 29.—Raymond in a Washington special to the Tribune says: In all probability the adjustment of the relations between the white and black races in America cannot be a matter of years, or even generations, but of centuries. It is of vast importance to the country, therefore, that some of the temporary problems regarding the colored race, as, for instance, whether the black people are to go on increasing and thus...

Statistics Are Lacking. Through the southern states there has been a great disregard of the important work of keeping vital statistics, and in the country sections it is impossible to secure anything except the most meagre of statistics. People who are well informed on other subjects take it for granted that because the negro is outclassing the whites in point of numbers in specified localities, his race is therefore growing faster than that of his former masters.

All the southern states are peculiar owing to the fact that there is practically no foreign immigration in that section of the country. The population here, therefore, is composed of the original southern European immigrants, notably the agricultural Italians, who could probably succeed in the future in competing with the negro in the field of agriculture.

Mortality is High. It so happens that in the city of Charleston an incident of vital statistics has been adopted, which has a direct bearing upon the race question. The figures there show that while the negro is reproducing himself much more rapidly than the white, he is subjected to the usual great law of compensation owing to the fact that his death rate is also nearly double that of the white man.

Of course if this death rate were all there was to the problem, the colored people would soon disappear and patience on the part of the whites would solve the race question. The negro, however, is not only in the cities, but everywhere else, are notoriously ignorant of the most ordinary laws of health. Nowhere is the mortality rate so high as in the South, and the world with a large percentage of malformation; they are frequently grossly neglected, suffer a great deal from disease of the eyes, and too often die from their diseased parents' maladies which their forefathers never knew in the barbaric wilds of Africa.

TRIED TO BRIBE HIM Hungarian Deputy Displays Gold to Prove It—Corruption in Austrian Diet.

Budapest, Hungary, July 29.—Deputy Zolman Papp caused a sensation in the lower house of the diet to-day by spreading out on the table 10,000 kronen in cash which he swore had been tendered to him as a bribe to desert his fellow obstructionists and leave Budapest. Herr Papp, who is a member of the Kossuth party, added that it was former Deputy Dienes who attempted to bribe him. Herr Dienes, he asserted, had 12,000 kronen, of which sum he retained 2,000 as commission and handed 10,000 kronen to Herr Papp, which the latter accepted in order to be able to prove his allegations.

YIELDS WILL BE GREAT Fine Cereal Crops in Southern South Dakota Are Attacked by the Harvesters.

Special to The Journal. Bonesteel, S. D., July 29.—The wheat and corn harvest is in full blast, and farmers say the yield will be enormous, their placing oats at 65 bushels an acre and wheat at 25. Some fields of oats will yield over 100 bushels an acre. Barley is estimated at 50 bushels and corn gives promise of a yield of at least 60 bushels. A two-five-acre field of flax one mile south of town, which was sown on spring breaking, is placed at 20 bushels an acre.

A cow swallowed two sticks. The workmen noticed that the animal seemed nervous, but did not know what ailed her. Finally the cow began running, and the sticks exploded. The explosion was so terrific that the cow was killed and when the workmen reached the spot they found the cow had eaten the sticks, nothing left except a few pieces of bones and hide.

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
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
