HE THRIVES ON SERUM

Seven-Year-Old Boy Takes 132 Bottles and Will Recover From Lockjaw.

New York Sun Special Service. St. Louis, Mo., July 30.—Charles A. Bothum, 7 years old, who fell a victim of tetanus following an accidental shooting on the Fourth of July, is recovering at the city hospital, but at a cost of almost \$500 in the purchase of serum to use in the case. Charlie was received in the hospital on July 16, and doses of anti-tetanic serum were immediately given him in injection every two hours. Each of these doses was a tablespoonful, and up to Wednesday, when the number had been reduced to two a day, he had received sixty-six injections. From Chicago 132 bottles of the stuff were sent, and one day a week ago he got none, for the supply at the hospital had run out. He is still being treated with serum, though the boy has passed over the acute and critical stage of lockjaw. For a day or so longer he will get the serum.

BRAWL ENDS IN BROIL

Husband Attempts to Cook His "Donner" on a Red Hot Stove.

New York Sun Special Service. St. Louis, Mo., July 30.—Matthew Donner of this city while in a fit of anger this morning, attempted to broil his wife on a red-hot stove. He was badly beaten over the head with a poker by his stepson, Henry Hoffmeister, who came to his mother's assistance. Hoffmeister is held a prisoner to await the result of Donner's charges. Mrs. Donner is at her home under the care of a physician. She is suffering from severe burns on the left arm and body, due to the fact that Donner threw her on the stove.

ZION "DON'TS"

Sign Board Commandments of Elijah the Second.

New York Sun Special Service. Waukegan, Ill., July 30.—In order that visitors to Zion City may be aware of the restrictions imposed by the city ordinances, sign boards of warning are to be set up. These signs read as follows: "Zion City prohibits use of intoxicating liquors, use of tobacco, use of profane and vulgar language, gambling, carrying of immoral literature, pork raising, secret societies, obscene billboards, doctors, drug shops, hospitals, theaters and dance halls, houses of ill-fame." The following things are also prohibited, most of them by city ordinance: Riding bicycles on sidewalks, driving on or over sidewalks, hitching horses to trees, bathing in the lake on Sundays, using narrow-tired wagons, idling about the streets, desecrating the Lord's day, destroying trees and canvassing or peddling.

JOLTED BY CUMMINS

Governor Tells the Bankers That a Reform in Currency Laws Is Necessary.

The "Conservatism of Prosperity" Stands in the Way of Progress, He Says.

Special to the Journal. Des Moines, Iowa, July 30.—Governor A. B. Cummins threw a bomb shell into the ranks of the bankers of Illinois and Iowa assembled in joint convention yesterday afternoon, by a strongly reiterated his reform views in an address which followed that of Congressman Fowler. He said in part:

"We make a fundamental mistake in assuming that the same laws under which a period of adversity was transformed into a period of prosperity will perpetuate that prosperity. In this era of the world's progress we do not simply repeat the experience of a former time, but we move forward developing new and wonderful phases of intellect and commercial life; and it is almost uniformly true that the prosperous years and not the years of adversity usher into existence the new problems which the government must meet. It therefore seems logical to shut our eyes to these problems and wait with fear and trembling until paralysis overtakes us, and so when least fitted for the work we undertake reforms which we seek to escape."

"This is the thought involved in my subject. It is the conservatism of prosperity. It is the inertia of 'stand pat' and is exemplified in the maxim which has been somewhat famous, 'Let well enough alone.' It is impossible to predict with absolute certainty the effect of a change in the law relating to the business world and as the divine poet has said, 'We prefer to suffer the ills we have than fly to others we know not of.' And second, there are always many influential persons who are reaping more than their fair share of the harvest and they reason that they would rather have all the few harvests than a just proportion of many harvests."

"You know and I know that a reform in the laws touching currency is one of the things necessary and that the tortured body of business attests it in the agony of its movements. Why is not reform effected? You may tell me that it is because the members of congress cannot agree upon a plan. But this will be a superficial answer. There are differences of opinion, but these have already been determined and always will differ upon such questions. "If you will examine profoundly your own hearts you will agree with me that the reason the Fowler bill or some other bill of like scope with a like general purpose was not adopted by the last session of congress is because there were too many members who wanted to 'stand pat' and were determined to let well enough alone. The real spirit that stands like a giant in the way of progress in this direction is the conservatism of prosperity."
