

JULY A BIG MONTH

C. P. R. Receipts for Land Almost Doubled Those of July of Last Year.

Liberals Gain a Seat by the Recount in the District of West Selkirk.

Special to The Journal. Winnipeg, Minn., Aug. 1.—The extent of land transfers was shown yesterday when the land department of the Canadian Pacific railroad issued its regular monthly statement.

The Canada Northwest land company disposed of 267,647.22 acres for \$1,020,404.70. For the same period last year the sales amounted to \$562,876.50, which sum was received for 155,344.93 acres.

The great advance in the price of land, in evidence more or less in Winnipeg and all over the northwest, has not yet been felt in St. Boniface, but it will be soon, for last night the council of the cathedral town approved of the plans offered by the Winnipeg Electric Street Railway company to construct and operate one and three-quarter miles of street railway there.

A Hospital Crisis. A meeting of the board of directors of the Winnipeg general hospital was held yesterday afternoon.

After some discussion it was decided to go on with the much-needed new buildings in view of the circumstances already published, and to request the city council to take the necessary action to provide the \$50,000 required for the work.

Liberal Gets the Seat. The result of the recount at West Selkirk yesterday of the votes cast in the St. Andrew and Kildonan electoral division was that Judge Myers awarded the seat to Martin O'Donoghue, liberal, by a majority of five votes.

WAR DEPT WIRELESS

Government Officers Establish Stations and Begin Experiments Upon the Connecticut Coast.

Milford, Conn., Aug. 1.—At this place, ten miles from New Haven, within the past few days have been established wireless stations to be used in experiments with Fishers Island. Captain Leonard D. Wildman, U. S. A., of the electrical division of the signal corps, and a detail are establishing stations along the Connecticut shore.

The apparatus consists of two wagons, each drawn by one horse, and at a distance looks very much like battery cars. One of the wagons contains the receiving and sending apparatus, the other a gas engine and dynamo for furnishing sending power, being a miniature electric power house, but powerful, for besides providing sufficient power for telegraphy it has an electric light equipment for night service.

The headquarters station is at Fort Wright, Fishers Island, over seventy miles from here, and messages have been sent and received as successfully as if by the old Morse system.

The system is the Braun-Siemens-Halske, with factories in Germany. The company claims to be the originator of wireless telegraphy.

Trainer in New York Is Teaching an Elephant to Perform the Feat.

The Pacific Squadron Was Nearly Wrecked on Alaskan Island. San Francisco, Aug. 1.—According to a letter received at this city from a member of the crew of the United States cruiser New York, the flagship and the other vessels of the Pacific squadron had a narrow escape from destruction on July 15, shortly before reaching Dutch Harbor, Alaska.

With the New York are the Marblehead and the Bennington. The vessels were steaming along in close order, the New York in the lead thru a dense fog at a fairly speedy gait. "Breakers ahead!" came suddenly from the lookout forward. All anchored and no move was made until the fog lifted.

Ahead, in every direction were to be seen breakers, and not a quarter of a mile ahead was an island on which the vessels would have been certainly wrecked but for the warning.

UMPIRES DISAGREE

Must Venezuela Pay Damages Arising Thru Revolutions?

Caracas, Venezuela, Aug. 1.—The mixed tribunal to pass on the foreign claims against Venezuela under the terms of the Bowen protocols is sitting in secret. Thursday the first decisions were reached. It is said that they involve some strange contradictions. For instance, Dr. Fliz, formerly president of the high court of the Dutch Indies, who is acting in the matter of the French claims against Venezuela, it is said, recognized all claims arising from the acts of revolutionists, whereas Jackson H. Ralston of Washington, who is umpire for Italy, recognized none of them.

STREET CAR HELD UP

Grand Lodge Official of Odd Fellows Was Shot Twice.

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 1.—John Kreinbuck, treasurer of the grand lodge of Odd Fellows of this state, was twice shot by a masked highwayman on a Hilliard street car last night.
