A STRENUOUS WOOING

Girl Whom He Then Compels to Marry Him.

The girl said she was on her way home when Marco met her. He tried to induce her to marry him, and on her refusal he gagged her, and tying her hand and foot, put her under threats and thru fear she said she was married by a justice.

After the hearing she says Marco took her to Newark and locked her in a room on Wilsey street. She escaped and went to her father's home at No. 84 Union street.

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STATE OF NEW JERSEY REAPS A RICH HARVEST FROM THE ORGANIZATION OF TRUSTS.

New York Sun Special Service. Trenton, N. J., Aug. 3.—Corporation Clerk John W. Brooks, of the secretary of state's office, has issued a statement showing that New Jersey has received since Jan. 1, 1901, in filing fees for charters, \$1,370,795.63. This represents only fees for chartering corporations, not the annual corporation tax, which runs into the millions.

The figures show that for the seven months ending last Friday the state's receipts from new corporations were over \$15,000 less than those received for the same time a year ago, and nearly \$25,000 more than half-less than those received for a like period in 1901, when the corporation business was at its best.

From Jan. 1 to Aug. 1, 1902, the state received \$24,157,487.42 for a similar period in 1901, the receipts from new corporations amounted to \$175,350.04.

DEEDS LAND TO TRINITY

Unique Course Is Taken, It Is Charged, to Escape Liability for Fraud.

New York Sun Special Service. Cartersville, Ga., Aug. 3.—A unique deed has been filed here in which Rev. W. H. Kerr transferred a tract of farm land to God, the Father, Christ, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, for many reasons received in hand paid, receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged on condition that the farm is to be used for an orphan's home, to be known as the "Kerr orphans' home," and that Rev. Mr. Kerr and his family are to be the Lord's trustees and that the land is still to be liable for Kerr's debts.

The reason for this peculiar deed has just been revealed by a suit filed here by a aged couple of the name of Cochran, members of Kerr's congregation, who claim that he defrauded them out of the land in exchange for a stock of goods, which he claimed to be worth much more than its true value, and that they were defrauded of their property and their confidence in Kerr. They ask to have the deed set aside and the land restored to them.

In the bill filed by the Cochrans it is charged that Kerr has no intention of devoting the land to the uses of God, but that he made the deed purely to protect himself for the results of the fraud which they allege he committed.

A QUEER LOVE STORY

Man Rejected Because of His Malodorous Profession Amasses Fortune in Gold Fields.

New York Sun Special Service. Albany, N. Y., Aug. 3.—Information has been received in Albany that Lewis Deuel in Australia at the age of 94 years. He left a fortune of \$50,000. He was a native of Granville and during the '40's was known as the champion skunk hunter and trapper of northern New York.

Deuel hunted the ill-smelling polecat for the value of its pelt. When he proposed marriage to a girl from Washington county, he was rejected because of his malodorous profession. Deuel pleaded piteously, but in vain, and in a frenzied moment left Granville, where he was born, and went to California, where he made his fortune in mining a secret until his death a few weeks ago.

Miss Deuel died a few years ago, never having married because, as she claimed in death, she loved none other than Lewis Deuel.

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DR. KIEHLE'S ILLNESS

He Is Overcome While Examining Applicants for State Teachers' Certificates.

While conducting an examination of applicants for state teachers' certificates Dr. D. L. Kiehle, formerly state superintendent of public instruction and subsequently professor of pedagogy at the university, was seized with a severe attack of vertigo.
