A TEACHER KILLED

Catherine Grathwohl of St. Paul Meets Death in Mountains Near Santa Barbara.

One Member of the Party Escapes and Becomes a Raving Maniac.

Mystery surrounds the death of Miss Catherine Grathwohl, a St. Paul teacher, who is reported to have died while on an excursion to the mountains near Santa Barbara, Cal., yesterday.

The brief dispatches received tell the story thus: Miss Katherine Grathwohl of St. Paul, Minn., is dead; Frederick Lueders, an artist of Santa Barbara, is a raving maniac and Fred Webster, Hellie Stone, Fred Gilbert and Grace Porter, also of this city, cannot be found.

Miss Grathwohl was staying in Santa Barbara for her health and was only 24 years old. His parents have received no details of the tragedy.
