

PARTNERS FELL OUT

Ballard Surprised His Runaway Wife and Williams on Their Joint Claim.

Shooting Duel Followed in Which Both Men Were Wounded, Ballard Fatally.

Butte, Mont., Aug. 24.—Felix Ballard was fatally shot near Elkhorn, forty miles from Butte, by Frank Williams, his partner in a mining claim, and Williams is now hiding in the timber, but he is wounded and it is believed he will be taken without difficulty. Sheriff Gibson of Boulder has left for the scene.

Several months ago it is alleged Williams ran away with Ballard's wife, taking her to Jarvis, and he has been in the neighborhood of these parts since until the report of the shooting came to Boulder.

It seems that on Saturday last Ballard went to the mine to do some of the annual representation work required, and it is reported that when he threw open the door of the cabin on the claim he was surprised and startled to behold his partner and erring wife inside.

It is said Williams opened fire with a large revolver. The shot was responded to by Ballard, who was carrying a shotgun. Ballard sustained a bullet wound in the right lung. As he dropped he emptied his shotgun at Williams, peppering him with fine bird shot.

It is supposed Williams also came back to do some representation work on the mine, as he intended to maintain his interests there notwithstanding his strained relations with his partner in the property, and by a strange coincidence, the two men and the runaway wife were brought face to face.

FRESH WATER SHIPS

Contracts for the Largest Ever Built About to Be Closed at Cleveland.

Wolvin of Duluth and His Associates Will Be Owners of New Craft.

Duluth, Minn., Aug. 24.—Announcement will soon be made from the Cleveland offices of the American Shipbuilding company of the closing of contracts for much the largest ships ever built for fresh water.

The first of these ships will be out some time the coming year. They are to be built for E. B. Wolvin and his associates, probably including some of those now interested with him in the President Steamship company. The ships are to be 55 feet long over all, probably about 57 feet beam and 21 feet deep. They will carry not less than 11,000 tons of ore or other bulk freight.

At present there are but two lower lake ports where such a ship can unload—South Chicago and Conneaut, Ohio. They can load at any one of the big upper lake ore ports like Duluth, Two Harbors, Ashland or Escanaba. Their construction will focus improvements to lower lake ports, for the first one will be followed by others in quick order. The financing of a company to contract these ships has been completed.

REBELLION NEARS CLOSE

Sultan of Simatra Ready to Submit to Dutch.

New York, Aug. 24.—Private news from Achin, says the Brussels correspondent of the Times, is to the effect that Fara-lima Polem and Rajah, Keumala, who have been for many years the chief rebel leaders, will formally submit to the Dutch in the course of the next few days. The colonial troops of the Netherlands have been at war with the Achins almost continuously since the year 1873. The cause of the war was the refusal of the sultan to recognize the suzerainty of the Netherlands. The sultan sent a secret embassy to the United States diplomatic agent at Singapore to apply for the military aid of this country and at the same time he dispatched commissioners to treat with the Dutch government.

Encouraged by the hope of aid from the United States and Great Britain, the sultan rejected the terms offered by the Netherlands. The war thus begun has cost the Dutch over \$200,000,000 and the lives of several good soldiers. One expedition after another has been sent to Sumatra, but as soon as the revolt has been apparently crushed it has broken out again. The Dutch have tried by every means to end the war, which has crippled the finances of the Dutch East Indies.

FOREIGN FLASHES

Rome—Menotti Garibaldi, eldest son of the Italian patriot is dead.

Lima, Peru—A mighty eruption of water is endangering the city of Huanc, a place of 20,000 inhabitants.

Kingston, Jamaica—The Cayman Islands were swept by a hurricane recently and it is feared great loss of life and property has resulted.

London—The Krupps of Berlin have begun a campaign to secure American bridge contracts in competition with the American steel trust.

London—The board of education complains that the professional life of the women teachers is only a "series of one long day."

London—Andrew Carnegie has settled \$200 a year for life on Mr. and Mrs. Brown to occupy the house in Dumfries in which Robert Burns died. Mrs. Brown is the daughter of the poet's eldest son, Robert.

Vienna—It is again rumored that Emperor Francis Joseph may abdicate in favor of his younger son because he is tired of political life. Private information declares the emperor is not ready to grant the crown to his younger son.

St. Petersburg—A general strike began Aug. 20 at Ekaterinoburg resulting in a complete stop of business in a clash with the soldiers eleven strikers were killed and twelve wounded. Work being resumed under military protection.

London—After drinking together in a saloon a Queensway Sunday night a number of German sailors from the warship Stock and British artillerymen fought in the roadway. Knives were used and one of the artillerymen were stabbed and seriously wounded.
