NEW LAW NEEDED

Minnesota Should Require All Private Banks to Incorporate.

Public Examiner Agrees With Criticism of the Financial Age.

Public Examiner Johnson agrees entirely with the criticism voiced by the Financial Age of New York against Minnesota's failure to enact laws regulating private banks. "The Age" says to-day: "The failures within a week of six private banks in Minnesota call attention to the lax banking laws of that state, which permit to the non-incorporated concerns to carry on business in their own peculiar fashion without even compelling them to submit to the formality of periodical examinations by the public examiner, who, by the way, has been the recipient of much unjust abuse because of the recent failures. He, however, is helpless to remedy the evil, which may be traced to the doors of the Minnesota legislature. The solons of the state have at last been furnished with an object lesson from which it is to be hoped they will profit. Wisconsin had a similar epidemic of disaster and the result was the passage of the new banking law compelling these concerns to either incorporate or go out of business. Most of them chose the former alternative and those that did not will not be missed.

"The failures have, unfortunately, fallen upon a class of depositors who could ill afford the loss of their bank accounts, and many of whom are ignorant of the distinction between incorporated and private institutions. The result has been to shake public confidence in the Minnesota state banks, which are really in excellent condition. Although several of the private bankers who went to the wall were heavily interested in a number of incorporated banks, the remedy of the latter has not been affected in the slightest degree by the failures—a fact which illustrates the efficiency of Public Examiner Johnson and his assistants, and a convincing argument in favor of placing under his supervision all private banking concerns throughout the state."

The article was shown to Mr. Johnson he said: "There have been seven of these failures, instead of six, and there are 249 of those institutions still doing business in the state, with many of them in the commercial agencies' reports show that four-fifths of them have no financial standing, yet they are allowed to advertise as banks and receive deposits at will. There is nothing to prevent them from throwing a depositor's money in the river. If they refuse to return his deposit on demand, he can get a judgment against the bank, but that is the best he can do.

"Section 2524 of the statutes of 1894 prohibits such banks from advertising or holding out inducements to depositors, and requiring them to incorporate. It is void, for the reason that it failed to get the necessary two-thirds vote in the house, and was thrown out by the supreme court. We have regulations for every other class of business that comes in contact with the public except private banks. If I do not mean all to be gathered. There are some strong private banks, but there is no reason why they should not incorporate, and the public has a right to require it. We will eventually have to pass such a law as we have in Wisconsin, requiring every concern which does a banking business to incorporate either under national or state laws."

FRED BONGE GONE. Newspaper Man Well Known Here Dies in Superior.

Fred Bonge, well known to a large number of people in and out of the newspaper business here and thruout the middle west, died of typhoid pneumonia at Superior, Wis., yesterday.

Mr. Bonge became widely known locally thru his connection with the twin city newspapers, altho he achieved his first and greatest fame while reporting for the Chicago Journal.

Upon the conclusion of the famous Luestger trial he successfully carried out a plan which enabled the Journal to have on the streets at midnight, five minutes after the Luestger jury had come to a decision, a complete report of the proceedings in the juryroom. In getting this big "beat" of the year Mr. Bonge tied a fellow reporter to a rope and hung him down an air shaft, afterward using this reporter's shorthand notes as the basis for his story.

After leaving Minneapolis two years ago Mr. Bonge became connected with the New York American. He went to the head of the lakes from Chicago about a year ago. He was 37 years old and a native of Kalamazoo, Mich. But one relative, a cloistered sister of the Order of the Good Shepherd, survives him.


TOOK A BIG CONTRACT. Janitor Accused of Eloping with a Woman and Her Two Children.
