### NEW AGREEMENT RATIFIED

Minor Leagues Indorse New Document as Amended.

Cincinnati, Sept. 11.—At a meeting of representatives of the National Association of Minor Baseball Leagues and of the national baseball commission here the

national agreement signed by the two major leagues recently and rejected by the minor league clubs was accepted by the latter organization after a few changes had been made.
