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TIPFOR THEOLOGIANS

Seminary Teachers Putting Emphasis in the Wrong Place, Says Dr. Montgomery.

Criticism Called Forth by Reports Concerning Leading Methodist Theological Teachers.

Seminary professors, too many of them, are forever putting the emphasis on the wrong thing. They are even teaching the boys under them what they should not believe, rather than what they ought to accept. This is the view of Rev. Dr. J. S. Montgomery, superintendent of the Methodist church, expressed in commenting upon a report from Chicago to the effect that the doctrines of Tom Paine are being taught by Dr. Milton S. Terry, professor of theology in Garrett Biblical institute, and by Dr. Hinckley G. Mitchell of Boston university. Dr. Montgomery said: "It was four years a student under Dr. Terry. I esteem him highly as a scholar and as a Christian gentleman. I do not believe the reports circulated about his teaching. Dr. Terry is a very thorough scholar; in fact, one of the greatest in Methodism. It is a pity that the red tape necessary and get the supplies. The fact remains, however, that too many of the teachers in seminaries, including Dr. Terry, are forever putting the emphasis on the wrong thing. They are overemphasizing telling the boys what they ought to accept, rather than what they ought to believe. The weakness is here—in affirmation there is strength; in negation there is just the opposite, and therein lies a fault that justly deserves criticism.

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SAY PROFS ARE SLOW

Members of Board of Control Tell Why Varsity Supplies Are Delayed.

Maintain That Estimates of the Things Needed Are Not Furnished Promptly.

The expected friction has arisen between the university faculty and the state board of control. The faculty complains that the board is so slow in filling their requisitions, that they are continually hampered for lack of supplies. This is especially true in the departments of chemistry, zoology and botany, where such a variety of materials are needed. The board of control requires estimates in advance, on which bids are asked and the supplies purchased. An incidental or emergency fund is allowed for things needed in less time than this process takes. Members of the board say that the university men were so slow turning in their estimates that they have not been able to get the supplies yet. The law requires bids to be asked, and this takes time. The board of control policy is to require quarterly estimates in advance, giving time to go thru the red tape necessary and get the supplies. Heads of the university department say that it is often impossible to anticipate their wants so long in advance.

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
