BATTLE IN A MINE

Forces of Heinze and the Amalgamated Have a Second Engagement Under Ground.

Later Routed by a Stream of Air Forced Thru a Quantity of Unslacked Lime.

Special to The Journal. Butte, Mont., Sept. 12.—An exciting and thrilling battle between two bodies of miners, one in the employ of F. Augustus Heinze on one side, and the other in the employ of the Amalgamated Copper company, occurred in the depths of the Pennsylvania mine, almost 2,000 feet under ground.

The clash occurred in a portion of the Pennsylvania mine, the ownership of which is claimed by both Heinze and the Boston & Montana company, and is now in the hands of the Amalgamated Copper company. Heinze, who claims the mine, is in possession of the mine, and is in possession of the mine.

The Heinze men were met by a force of miners under Superintendent J. C. Adams of the Boston & Montana company. The men began hostilities without any parleying, and after about ten minutes of strenuous hunting, rocks and loose earth began to fly thru the level.

The weight of the numbers of the Pennsylvania men, when several sacks of unslacked lime were sent down the Rarus shaft, caused the Heinze men to retreat. The stream of air was set thru the lime and directed upon the opposing force.

FIRST MINISTER IN NOME

Rev. Mr. Bloor Visits Old Scenes and Friends at Superior.

SUPERIOR, WIS.—Rev. C. H. H. Bloor, for two years pastor of the church in the Redeemer of this city, has the distinction of having been in Nome, Alaska, as the first minister at work in the church there.

He has been in the superior for a few days while on his way to Europe, having obtained a leave of absence for a year.

The Bloor has recently been appointed archdeacon of the territory of Alaska, having the duties of this office, besides those of his regular rectorship. In speaking of Nome, he says it has grown to be almost a model town. The roughness has worn off. He said:

Yes, it was the first minister in Nome and enjoyed the work. It is no longer a mining camp, but has attained the dignity of a city. Last winter we had 3,000 people, as against 10,000 in the summer time. This year we have had 10,000 people during the summer, and the prospects are we will have 5,000 the coming winter. Of course most of the people are men, but they are now good men, and some families are coming in.

The United States government does not do for us what the Canadian government does for Dawson City. We have absolutely nothing done, while the Canadian government has fine roads, excellent government and everything that is desired in a town in that country.

There are great possibilities in Alaska and I enjoy the work there very much.
