DEATH OF THOS. CONROY, SR.

Father of Superintendent of Police Dies at His Home Here.

Thomas Conroy, Sr., father of Superintendent of Police Ed. J. Conroy, died at 12:30 a. m. to-day at his residence, 1225 Fourteenth avenue SE. He was 82, and had resided in this city since 1858.

Mr. Conroy was married in Dublin, June 10, 1852, and celebrated his golden wedding July 10, 1902. He was the father of five children, Joseph, Thomas, Jr., Mrs. Mary Quinlan, Edward J. and John, all of whom are still living.

MUCH CASH NEEDED

Board of Tax Levy Will Face Several Serious Problems Next Monday.

Long Deferred Public Improvements Must Be Made—What Will the Rate Be?

The first meeting of the board of tax levy is called for Monday at noon, but nothing can be done except reorganize, for the state board of equalization will not be that time have fixed the assessed valuation of Hennepin county.

There are serious problems for the board to solve. The continued growth of the city, and the fact that public improvements along certain lines have been neglected for one reason or another, have imposed extensive demands for relief.

About \$50,000 has been provided for a bridge across the river at Thirty-second avenue N. and \$100,000 is needed. The Washington avenue bridge, which carries the interurban line, needs to be widened and strengthened.

Make-Up of Board. The board will be composed of Mayor James G. Hayes, City Controller Joshua Rogers, Alderman A. E. Merrill, chairman of the council committee on ways and means.

It may be possible to keep the rate of taxation down to that of this year, which was 25.33 mills, including the special ward taxes.

Board of Equalization Votes Increased Values in Pianos and Organs. The state board of equalization yesterday afternoon fixed the value of melodeons and organs at \$15, and as the large majority of counties returned them at about \$13, they were uniformly raised.

Melodeons and Organs—Murray valued 50 per cent; Norman, 33 1/3; Clearwater, Faribault, Popo, Rice and Rock, 30; Dakota and Grant, 25; Carver, Miller Lacs, Pipestone, Sibley, Winona and Yellow Medicine, 20; Fillmore, Kanabec, Kitten, Lake, Red Lake, Stevens, Wadena and Watonwan, 15; Aitkin, Douglas, Goodhue, Lyon, Olmsted, Otter Tail, Roseau, St. Louis and Beltrami, Chippewa, Chisago, Nicollet, Redwood, and Waseca, 5; Mower and Otter Tail were devalued 10 per cent and St. Louis was devalued 5 per cent.
