President Sexton Decides That Receipts Will Not Pay for Finishing Schedule.

Peoria, Ill., Sept. 18.—Yesterday evening after the close of the last game between Colorado Springs and Peoria, President Sexton of the Western League, presiding over an official announcement declaring the season of the Western league officially closed. The schedule had not been finished but the weather gave no promise of brightening up and the remaining games to be played were all scheduled in cities where the attendance has been small.

The abrupt termination of the season is considered to be a financial saving to all clubs concerned, and President Sexton declares the western circuit will remain intact and that the same cities will comprise the circuit next year which comprise it this season.
