

CANADIAN SOO IS HARD HIT
3,500 Men Lose Their Places by Shutdown of Consolidated Lake Superior.
 Chief Industry of Western Ontario at a Full Stop—Boats to Be Laid Up.

 Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Sept. 19.—News that the plants of the Consolidated Lake Superior company have been ordered to shut down was naturally received with consternation by the business men of the two Soos, although it had been generally believed for a month that some such a thing would force after a minority of the stockholders objected to the reorganization plans.
 The American Soo is but slightly affected. The only branch plant in operation here is a small electrical section power building that furnishes the current for the street railway and ferry service, and this will be kept in operation on either side of the river until reorganization is effected.
 The Canadian Soo is hard hit. All industries except the Lagona Light and Power company have been closed down. At least 3,500 employees are affected, the majority of whom had been engaged in the mines and woods. Ore carriers on their way to Michipicoten will come down light and be laid up.
 The mines, which include the Helen, Iron, Grace, gold, and Gertrude, nickel, all paying propositions, are closed down. This means that the biggest industry of western Ontario is temporarily out of business.
 It is confidently expected, however, that things will soon assume their normal condition, inasmuch as several of the plants have been operated at a large profit this year.
 Hundreds of thousands of cords of wood are ready for shipment to charcoal kilns and a large quantity of pine and pulp wood await transportation to the mills.

DEATH OF W. T. WILKINS
 An Early Settler of Minnesota and Former State Senator.

 Austin, Minn., Sept. 19.—W. T. Wilkins, an early settler of southern Minnesota, died at his home here at 5:30 to-day of pneumonia, after a brief illness, aged 76. He was born in Chataqua county, New York, and came to Spring Valley in 1854. He was registrar of deeds of Fillmore county eight years. He came to Austin in 1888, and was state senator from Mower county in 1888.
 He was formerly in the banking business here. His wife and only child are dead. He was a member of St. Bernard commandery, Knights Templar, which will have charge of his funeral.

A TOUR OF TRIUMPH
 The Journal Band of Newsboys Everywhere Enthusiastically Received in South Dakota.
 More Banqueting at Redfield and Aberdeen—Final Concert at Oakes, N. D.

 Oakes, N. D., Sept. 19.—The home-seekers and investors' excursion, accompanied by the Journal Newsboys band, arrived in Oakes this town, turning out en masse to welcome and hear the little red-coated musicians.
 The Journal Newsboys band, traveling thru South Dakota, had with it ten cars of visitors from all parts of the central states. At Watertown, where the first stop was made, the band was given at the opera-house, after which a banquet was tendered. Covers were laid for 100.
 At Huron a band stand was built, and the public school dismissed in honor of the excursion and the Journal band. Fully 500 people were there.
 At Doland the public schools were closed. The children of the entire town of Doland were at the station to welcome the excursionists and all business was at a standstill.
 At Redfield a band stand was also built and an open air concert given. Mr. Morris, in behalf of the citizens, welcomed the excursionists and the band to Redfield.
 "We welcome you to our city. We are glad to have you with us. Our surrender is complete, we surrender all but our pride, our courage and our patriotism. This is the first time our city has surrendered to an army of newsboys, but we surrender to such musicians as you. Boys, I don't want to tire you with blowing; you are to do that, so we have fixed a supper for you. There you will find many of the good things that grow in South Dakota."

REASON YIELDS TO GRIEF
 Young Bride Drowns and Her Husband Becomes Almost Crazy With Grief.

Atlantic City, N. J., Sept. 19.—Almost crazed by the death of his beautiful young bride of three months of whose death in the surf he had been informed by telegraph, Burton Mustif of Germantown rushed from the Philadelphia train at Ocean City to the beach and into the breakers in an attempt to find her corpse. Finding that his clothes impeded his movements the frenzied man removed them without leaving the water and allowed them to float away, losing the watch which the young wife had given him on her wedding day, and nearly four hundred dollars in bills in the pockets. Life guards who witnessed the man's act went out to him with a life boat and suggested that he be taken to shore. Mustif, who was 23, was caught in an undertow while bathing and was swept away.
HARD PRISONER TO HANDLE
 Kunnecke, in Jail at Pierre, Attempts Again to Escape.
 PIERRE, S. D.—Jailer Logan has a hard case to handle in the person of William Kunnecke, who is a Stanley county prisoner, held on a charge of the murder of Andrew Demery, a sheepherder who was working for him. Since Kunnecke has been imprisoned awaiting trial he has made three attempts to escape, and has to be watched constantly. Tuesday afternoon he cut one of the inner bars to the jail window half off with a saw made from a case knife, before his work was discovered.

WITNESS IS ARRESTED

Kentucky Authorities Find Man Who Is Said to Have Seen Cookrell Killed.
 Lexington, Ky., Sept. 19.—Sheriff Woodson McCord, who arrested Curtis Jett for the Marcum murder, to-day arrested Charles Green, the chief witness in the Cookrell case. Green is said to have seen Jett fire the fatal shot. He has been fleeing from the officers ever since the trial was called. He told his wife he was going to Canada to keep from being assassinated by Jett's friends, but he went to his father-in-law's home instead.
 When McCord called he was told Green was not there. McCord insisted on searching the premises and was admitted. When McCord drove up to the place Green was standing at the window with a revolver, but he did not shoot. Green was taken to Cynthiana to-day. He is considered the most important witness for the commonwealth in the pending trial.
 In the Curtis-Jett trial witnesses testified that they heard shots fired and immediately afterward saw Jett come out of the court house. Harrison B. Lanton said he heard Jett say: "This is the forty-fifth that I laid law."

USES KNOCKOUT CIGARS

Philadelphia Hold-up Artist Hits Upon a New Trick in an Old Trade.
 Philadelphia, Sept. 19.—Drugging a man's cigar after asking him for a light is the latest "knockout method."
 The police are now looking for the inventive criminal genius who has introduced this original scheme of robbery. They believe that at present only one "knockout" man is practicing the method. The latest acquisition to the powers that prey is a tall, slender man with a sandy mustache. He picks out a man with a cigar, waits until his victim reaches a dark spot and then approaches him with an apology and a polite request for a light. In his right hand, held between his third and little finger, is a tiny bulb containing some powerful narcotic.
 The intended victim professes his smoking weed and the other accepts it with his right hand and lights his cigar. While holding it he dexterously presses the unlighted end against the needle of the concealed bulb, and when he is sure that the point is penetrating the cigar he squeezes his fingers together and the cigar is in condition to deprive its owner of his senses.
 Then when the smoker succumbs the "knockout" man, duffly goes thru the unconscious man's pockets. The impression would be that the victim had been overcome by heart failure or had fainted from exhaustion.
 GRAND JUROR, N. D.—The arguments in the Westley Styles habeas corpus proceedings have been finished and the attorneys given until Tuesday to file their briefs. Styles is under arrest for manslaughter committed at Madock some time ago. The supreme court then adjourned till Monday.
