THINGS WORTH KNOWING

Bits of Scrapbook Wisdom on Various Household Articles.

It is far more important that a wife and mother should understand the chemical values of food and right sanitary conditions than that she should be an immaculate housekeeper or a fine needle-woman.

Many a woman who will put in hours tucking a frock for her child will allow that child to run the gravest risks thru contaminated milk or sewer gas.

"A simple way to wave the hair without the agency of a hot iron is to braid it in three braids," says an expert hairdresser.

Let one strand be small and the other large. Braid loosely, and when the end of a braid is reached hold it small strand tight while pushing the others up toward the roots. Pin it into place and allow it to remain so overnight. When you comb it out in the morning you will find it has formed into large, natural looking waves.

Many women do not know that jelly to suit every taste, from tart to sweet, can be made from grapes by using them in the various stages, from green to full ripe.

One reason for this is that grape growers do not market the fruit before it is ripe, because it does not look so nice and so the customer is not willing to pay the same price. It may be to late now for green grapes, but the half-ripe can be had.

In stripping the stem from the greenest grapes, cut the stem from the grape one by one using the whole grape, and another by using the juice from the pulp only, the skins being removed and saved to put with the pulp after the juice is nearly all taken off, to make butter or marmalade.

In making any kind of jelly, do not drain off all the juice, just run it through, then put the pulp thru a colander or potato squeezer to remove the seeds. If it then treated in the same way as corn, and makes a good jelly for common use, also not so good as the other. But if one prefers, it can be made up into butter or marmalade.

The newest pattern in embroidery is the corn-flower. King Edward's favorite flower. No one who has seen the corn flowers starring the cornfields in England and on the continent will ask for a prettier flower to work.

The following is a good way of removing the old stain from floors before applying new, and it is always advisable to do this if the new stain is to look really well.

Use a solution of potash in the proportion of 1 pound to 2 gallons of water, and apply it hot. Wash it with warm water, and then, to bleach the boards, use a solution of oxalic acid (1 ounce to every pint of water). Rinse this thoroughly off with warm water, and be sure that the floor is perfectly dry before you begin laying on the new stain.

Pine Apple Omelet—For a small omelet, just enough for one person, beat the whites and yolks of three eggs separately to a stiff froth, then put the whites and yolks together and whip them again, with the addition of a teaspoonful of lemon juice and a tablespoonful of sugar. Put the eggs in a hot omelet pan over the fire with plenty of butter. When ready to fold sprinkle in the omelet a heaping teaspoonful of grated fresh pine-apple. Serve on a hot platter. Dust the omelet with powdered sugar.
