IT'S A GREAT HONOR

Wyman Elliot Explains Significance of Wilder Medal Among Apple Growers.

He Returns From Boston With the Medal Won by T. E. Perkins.

The Wilder medal, longed for by every American apple grower, has been awarded to T. E. Perkins of the Minnesota Horticultural society by the American Pomological society for the best display of apple seedlings at the Pomological society's twenty-eighth biennial exhibition, held in Boston, Sept. 10-12. The medal was brought back to Minneapolis yesterday in the hands of Wyman Elliot, the local horticulturist, who went to Boston as representative of the horticultural society. Minnesota also obtained at Boston an honorable mention for commercial varieties of apples.

"The Pomological society," said Mr. Elliot, yesterday, "was founded in 1848 and is the oldest and most important society of the sort in this country. Its Wilder medal is a most distinguished honor. It is valued by apple growers far more than any cash prize, because the medal is given only for some genuine achievement in apple culture.

"Our seedlings were such an achievement. They consisted of 200 plates of the Perkins seedlings, grown by T. E. Perkins of Red Wing. These plates represented wonderful success in the propagation of seedlings. In Michigan and in the northwest, before long, with several new and superior varieties of apples specially adapted to our climate.

"The honorable mention for commercial varieties of apples is also a great honor in view of the fact that our apple growers competed, at Boston, with horticulturists from Michigan, Kansas and other places, where apple raising for the market was successfully established long before Minnesota had ceased to raise apples. The display that was won in this department consisted of fruit at random from the apple exhibit at our state fair."
