**'ROLLING IN MONEY'**  
Squalid Rooms of Veregin, Prince of the Dukhobors, Fairly Lined With It.

Enormous Purchases of Machinery, Horses and Harness for His Queer People.

Winnipeg, Sept. 24.—In a squalid house in Rosenblat terrace a reporter found Peter Veregin, the Dukhobor leader, last night. Strawn around the room every conceivable place were rolls of bills of large denominations and when the Dukhobor chief rose from the bed wrapped in his blanket the reporter, a large wave of bills fell to the floor.

Reporter Was Dazed.  
At this point of the interview the reporter noticed that the seat was not altogether straight, and as he moved to get in a more comfortable position, Mr. Veregin said something to the interpreter, who asked the reporter to get up for a minute, and then it was discovered that he had been sitting on a roll of bills which contained several thousand dollars. Continuing Veregin said:

"I also bought 300 teams of horses from Messrs. Ryan and Farse. I went up to their ranches at Waldock and Rush Lake and found that the railway company would charge \$12 for each horse if I sent them by rail, so I decided to have them driven to Winnipeg."

The reporter then left this prince of the Dukhobors, sipping his cup of tea, and surrounded by apparently unlimited heaps of dollars lying over the room in a very careless fashion.

The Dukhobors in western Canada will establish and erect sixty English schools in as many of the villages as soon as human effort can effect it. The Quakers have exchanged their ideas with Veregin, and it may be said that the plan by which it is proposed that \$10,000 be spent by the Quakers on Dukhobor education will be that the Dukhobors erect their own schools, while the \$10,000 will be for support of teachers.

**STRIKE AGAINST DOWIE**  
Elijah II. Has a Full Fledged Labor War on His Hands.

Chicago, Sept. 24.—Labor troubles have found their way into Zion City. Mutiny in Dowie's North Shore city promises to mar the start of the restorationists' onward march on New York and the opportunity to capture the city.

Smarting under what they considered the peremptory discharge of Arthur Stevenson, superintendent of the Zion City lace factory, the men in the manufacturing plant have been brewing for some time. Arthur Stevenson is a brother of Samuel Stevenson, who several months ago brought a successful suit against Dowie. He charged fraud and misrepresentation and a jury awarded him a verdict of several thousand dollars.

This relationship is said to have been the original cause of the feeling that exists between Arthur Stevenson and the head of Zion.

**EDWARD IS NO PUPPET KING**  
Britain's Sovereign Takes a Lively Interest in the Selection of the New Cabinet.

London, Sept. 24.—The political crisis has taken on a more unappreciated interest. The king has exerted his influence not unconstitutionally or beyond the power vested in the crown, but to an extent never dreamed of in the Victorian era.

Premier Balfour's continued presence at Balmoral, which has given rise to much surmise and comment, is the latest determination not to assent to the formation of a new cabinet until thoroughly satisfied that his personal subjects to such an efficient carrying on of the affairs of the empire pending the resumption of parliament.

Ministers now holding office and those nominated for office have been summoned to Balmoral and subjected to such interrogation as has surprised even those who know King Edward intimately.
