

MANY SEE PICTURES

First Week's Attendance at Fine Arts Exhibit Is Gratifyingly Large.

The attendance for the opening week of the fourth annual exhibition of the Minneapolis Society of Fine Arts at the public library has been gratifyingly large and there is a prospect that the receipts may this year pay the expenses of the exhibition. They should do this for the importance and high standard of the exhibits warrant such support.

It is very unfortunate that people having the money to buy paintings do not appreciate the opportunity afforded by these exhibitions where the pictures have the guarantee of competent critics as to their worth and where they can be bought for their actual value. Mr. Koehler and the exhibition committee are always willing to place their artistic judgment at the service of would-be purchasers and will endeavor to make the best possible terms with the artists.

An important acquisition of the Athenaeum board for the art room of the public library made this summer is a collection of paintings by the leading American artists of the day. JACK HAS NO GERMS

The Navy Is Healthy, According to Surgeon M. F. Gates of the Atlanta.

Interesting Incidents of His Recent Cruise Along South American Coast.

It is difficult to die in the United States navy says Surgeon M. F. Gates, late of the cruiser Atlanta. The navy is a fountain of life, if not of youth, because it is healthy, practically germless, explained Dr. Gates to-day at the home of his brother-in-law, LeRoy Robertson, 2615 Clinton avenue. The surgeon himself appears a youthful man, his professional word is needed to convince callers that he has treated cases of "shore leave" for more than fourteen years.

Conquering Yellow Jack. "Our three years were spent almost entirely on the eastern coast of South America. We found that some of the South American cities have profited from the example of the Americans in Cuba and have insisted upon sanitary cleanliness about the ship. So we didn't have one case of fever.

At Santo Domingo City the Atlanta put in to see the revolutions. "We saw a fine specimen," says Dr. Gates. "It was exhibited by prominent citizens of the island. Almost all of the people who were in the streets, most of the leaders were mulattoes. Whenever the cannon got particularly loud we would hear business men call for their guns, see them enter their carriages and drive out to the old Spanish walls to take part in the shooting. He always quit firing early enough to drive back in time for dinner. As a prominent merchant told me: 'Even a patriot must consider his health.'"

"But the natives are brave enough. We saw half a dozen young men climb down the outside of the city wall, and shooting as they went, with their rifles at their hips, trot across an open field in the face of a rattling volley from three dozen of the enemy who were taking aim from behind some earthworks. The three dozen were firing Mausers and Remingtons; it wasn't a wholesale outing for the six. But they stopped at Santo Domingo—the wounded from both sides. This was the first time to the natives. They never have military surgeons. Most people praised us. But some were unkind—we were less than we should be. After a ten days' visit—his first homecoming since he was married ten years ago—Dr. Gates will go to Philadelphia for a tour of shore duty.

IRRIGATION BILL ERROR

Senator McCumber, North Dakota, Thinks There Is One.

Senator McCumber of North Dakota, talking yesterday in the senate, said he was not satisfied with the irrigation bill in its present form. Before this legislation is completed the senator would recommend a change in the provision that practically taxes one state for improvements in another state.

"The bill," says he, "establishes a fund for irrigation works and that fund is derived from the proceeds of the sale of arid lands in all the states. But certain states have a very small area, that can be reclaimed, and other states are going to undertake vast works. During my recent trip thru Colorado and Nevada, I found that those states were preparing irrigation schemes that will involve immense expenditure."
