

HE CUT OFF HER HAIR

And Mrs. Gorman Promptly Has Her Husband Arrested for His Deed.

In Jail He Weepingly Declares Marriage to Be a Dark, Dismal Failure.

New York, Oct. 1.—Bartley Gorman, a beardless young man who did not get along well with his wife, sat in his cell in the Bayonne, N. J., prison to-day and wept when a messenger brought to him the information that he would be compelled to remain in jail indefinitely. In a fit of rage Gorman had cut the hair from his wife's head. "I cut her hair to keep her in the house," said Gorman, "and now she's keeping me in jail because I cannot insure the payment of \$4 a week for her support. My advice to young men is to never get married."

"Instead of buying candy you've got to buy chuck steak and shoes. Then the landlord comes around for his rent and he gives you sass and you must take it because you're married. The baby gets a crying spell in the middle of the night and you've got to get out of bed to mix the condensed milk for the nursing bottle, and such as that. Oh, why is a fellow such an ass?"

Mrs. Gorman sits weeping and bemoaning the loss of her hair. When a reporter called at her apartments to-day she had a towel tied about her head.

"My husband completely scalped me," she said. "He came into my sleeping apartment just as I dozed off and proceeded to cut off my hair. I tried to fight him away, but he held me down and clipped all of my hair away from one side of my head. When I looked at myself in the mirror and saw my beautiful hair gone from one side, I said to him: 'You brute, you can now cut off the rest of it, so that the mother of your child will look like a monkey instead of a chimpanzee.'"

"Then he seized the shears again and cut off the rest of it, leaving me practically bald."

The wife is but 17 and has no means to care for herself or her two months' old infant.

PLAY SPELL FOR SHAW

Secretary Visits Des Moines Unannounced and Confers with Anti-Cummins Men.

Des Moines, Iowa, Oct. 1.—Leslie M. Shaw, secretary of the treasury, quietly dropped into Des Moines to-day for the avowed purpose of nothing more serious than a hearty handshake rather than his intimate friends. He explained that he had been summoned to Chicago on business and found himself with an extra twenty-four hours at his disposal. He chose to spend it here rather than in Chicago. He visited the statehouse alone and unannounced. He first warmly greeted the janitors and elevator boys, each of whom he called by their first names, then amused himself by slipping into the various state offices, covering the eyes of the first person he met with his hands and compelling him to guess who he was.

Governor Cummins was out of the city engaged in campaign work, and hence the secretary did not see his successor in the gubernatorial chair.

Mr. Shaw found time to closet himself with the leading members of the republican state central committee for several hours during which, it is surmised, something was done. Those with whom he held communion were enemies of Governor Cummins. They say the secretary said nothing about his own presidential aspirations, but did not deny that those of Cummins were dissonant.

The secretary agreed to participate in the Iowa campaign this year.

THOSE TRUST CO.'S

There Are Good and Bad Ones Assimilating the Lands of the Indian.

Good Ones, of Course, Are Those Managed by Members of the Dawes Commission.

Muskegon, Indian Territory, Sept. 28.—A "trust company" down here in Indian Territory, is an "invented" institution. That it is benevolent is amply testified to by its promoters and officials, and that their ultimate purpose is assimilation no one denies.

The lands and properties of the perquisites and the percentages of the enfranchised and citizenized Indian, are the subject matter on which the trust company feeds. There are nearly a million acres of desirable lands, all rich and marketable within easy reach of the companies, and the feast is just about to begin.

Our Tams in a "Good Company."

There are good trust companies, and bad trust companies. At least that is the information which comes from the officials of the Dawes commission—and they should know, for the commissioners are all interested in such companies. As all the world knows that Tams Bixby of Minneapolis, the commission's chairman, is president of one of the trust companies, the Canadian Valley, with offices in the same building, and just a floor below the rooms of the commission. In fact, the rooms used to be occupied by the commission for sitting down to the "treaty table," and there is still a little spiral staircase leading below, which has been blocked up by a bookcase and letter file. The former attorney for the commission, F. B. Hopkins, is vice president of the Canadian Valley Trust company, and its active manager. The Hon. Thomas Needles, a member of the Dawes commission, is a stockholder and director in another trust company, the International Trust and Banking company, with headquarters at Vinita, I. T., while Major Breckinridge, another commissioner, and the legal authority for the commission, is interested in the Buffalo Trust company at Euflala, I. T. Even the newest member of the Dawes commission, former Governor Stanley of Kansas, inadvertently secured stock in one of the companies.

These gentlemen are all promoters to be counted among the directors and stockholders of the good trust companies. I talked to them, and found them willing and eager to be identified with these "righteous" institutions. The only complaint is that their good companies have not been differentiated from the bad "grafting" companies, in the accounts which have gone out to the world.

A "Bad Grafting" Defined.

A "bad grafting" trust company is one organized by persons having no connection with the Dawes commission, whose avowed purpose is to make money by any means not leading to jail. The good trust companies, on the contrary, do not take leases on Indian lands, which a corrupt and heinous practice in the way it is carried on—but are ambitious chiefly to "develop the country" by lending money and acting as administrators for Indians who do not know enough to manage their own affairs. Mr. Bixby's company, which has only been open for business since the first of July, is a channel for "eastern capital." As explained by Vice President Hopkins, the company does not propose to buy lands from the Indians, but stands ready to loan money to persons who want to buy but have no money. This shows the benevolence of the company. The loan is made at 8 per cent interest, or higher, and the mortgage is sold to eastern capitalists for a 6-per-cent investment. That leaves a 2-per-cent margin, which makes everybody happy. If the borrower of the money and buyer of the land is unable to keep up the interest, or repay the principal, the company will, of course, be obliged to assimilate the land.

5,000 Estates to Administer.

Commissioners Breckinridge's trust company, at Euflala, has an idea of specializing on the administration of estates. He estimates that there will be about 5,000 estates to be handled, and he is apt to some good trust company to administer upon them. When it is considered that 15,000 wards of the nation are just now having their property transferred to them in a spirit of philanthropy, and of zeal to protect the Indian against the wicked and designing trust companies of outsiders, has organized the Buffalo.

Wishes. There are minors among the Indians, there are small children who are entitled to participate in the general distribution, but who will not be able to dispose of the property for many years to come. These children must have guardians, and their guardians must give bonds, and who is so competent to give bond as a trust company, or so kindly disposed toward the "ad litem" interests of children?

Commissioners Have Valuable Knowledge. The Dawes Commission trust companies should particularly competent to deal with the property of these Creek Indians, for the Dawes commissioners who direct them have had peculiar facilities for acquiring information in regard to the property. They have been over the ground, literally, with surveying parties, and have supervised the plotting, appraisal and distribution of every acre to be sold. They know, as well as it is possible for anybody to know, where are located the best farm lands, the timber, the stone, the oil, the coal and the minerals. They have been trustees of the estate, in the government pay for a number of years, and they know all about the value of the estate. They also know the Indians and the 12,000 negroes who are members of the tribe and classified as Indians, having had them all before them, one by one. In their capacities as trust directors they can turn to good use the knowledge acquired as commissioners, and should be able to do a good line of business for their co-partners in trust.

A lot of money is going to be absorbed by somebody in this vicinity—and at an early date. It is not every day that 15,000 children come "into their own." Just think of it! No less than 750,000 acres of land, now theirs, with the right to sell. And the first sale was for \$35.80 an acre! Suppose the average price to be \$30 an acre; that would be \$15,000,000 about to be distributed. And some of the land has a speculative value—it is on the edge of cities which some day will be great—and is worth hundreds and even thousands of dollars an acre. This property is being turned over to 12,000 colored people and mulattoes, and 3,000 child-like ignorant survivors of a decadent race—a race which has not been able to hold its own, even against the negro, either in numbers or industrially—and all of whom, red, white and black,
