Mr. McSwaney was one of the most popular advertising men in the twin cities. For twenty years he was engaged in the business here, first on the old Saturday Evening Spectator, and then with the dailies.

A POSER FOR THE BEARS HIS SINS WORRIED HIM

Light Receipts of Wheat Cause Short John O'Donnell Confesses to Chief Conroy Who Sends Him to Probate Court.

Only 547 cars of wheat in the northwest against 1,384 on the corresponding day last year—this was the showing that confronted the bears in wheat this morning. Naturally, there was some nervousness and short covering in the local pit, and another fair advance was made, Minneapolis December wheat being up 7 1/2 cents to 77 1/2 cents.

Rains were heavy and general last night, Moorhead showing 6 1/2 inches; La Crosse, .99 inches; Keokuk, 1.90 inches; St. Louis, .32 inches; Sioux City, 1.44, and Minneapolis-St. Paul, 2.48 inches to 3 o'clock this morning. This is bad weather and means a light movement of wheat from the country.

In Minneapolis there were 181 cars this morning against 378, Duluth fell off to 283 against 741 and Chicago had 80 against 245. Kansas City received 181,000 bushels against 91,000 bushels and St. Louis 47,000 bushels against 97,000 bushels.

Nation's Wheat Crop. The final report of the Orange Juice Farmer is out. Winter wheat is said to average 12.9 bu per acre and spring wheat 12.8 bu. Winter wheat totals 444,000,000 and spring wheat 260,000,000 or 704,000,000 bu in all. Locally it is thought to be a little high, as the total for Minnesota and the Dakotas is placed at 130,000,000 bu compared with 125,000,000 bu in 1902.
