WESTERN UNION WINS BIG SUIT

It Gets a Judgment for \$3,600,000 Against the Bell Telephone Company.

Money Found to Be Due Under Terms of a Contract Made in 1879.

Boston, Oct. 8.—By a decision of the United States court of appeals, the Western Union Telegraph company wins a suit for \$3,600,000, the American Bell Telephone company paying the bill.

Nov. 10, 1879, the Western Union company and the Bell company entered into a contract whereby the former gave the latter exclusive use of its telephone patents, agreed that it would obtain and transfer others similarly and would withdraw from the manufacture, rental and use of telephones, thus giving the Bell company a monopoly of the telephone business.

After the contract was made, the Western Union charges, the telephone company changed its methods of business, receiving instead of for cash for the use of telephones both cash and stocks for all stock. It gave the telegraph company 20 per cent of such stocks received and the Western Union finally sued, alleging that \$18,000,000 had been received in stocks.
