

STILL ON \$8 BASIS

Soo Road Sells Tickets East Based on \$8 Chicago Rate.

The Soo road is still selling tickets east based on an \$8 rate to Chicago. The Soo was not notified of the proposed advance to \$11 and it maintained the rate. Since notification has been sent General Passenger Agent W. E. Callaway remains silent and the tickets are still on sale. It is hoped to reach an immigration basis which will satisfy the Rock Island. Its attitude has disturbed the situation all summer.

All Chicago roads to-morrow will have restored the former Chicago rate of \$11.50 or \$23 for the round trip. The Rock Island's notice is effective under the interstate commerce commission rules Oct. 15. For a week it has been the only line selling tickets to Chicago at \$8. It is said that the other lines have not said much on account of this differential.

WISCONSIN CENTRAL CUT-OFF

Line From Chippewa Falls to Marshfield Is Authorized.

The Wisconsin Central cut-off of forty miles to be built between Chippewa Falls and Marshfield was authorized at the annual meeting Tuesday. The work will be done this fall. The cut-off will run from Chippewa Falls to Greenwood, by which branch it will return to the main line at Marshfield, thus cutting out Abbottford.

Will Add to Stock.

La Crosse, Wis., Oct. 15.—The La Crosse & Black River Falls Railroad company will materially increase its capital stock this winter and next spring work will begin on the construction of an electric railway from this city to Black River Falls. The survey has been completed and the officers of the company say that nearly everything is in readiness for the beginning of the work.

The Santa Fe has contracted for 500 up-to-date refrigerator cars to be delivered in time for handling the company's California fruit and vegetable crop for eastern markets.

Aged Man From Winnebago City Who Was Recently Picked Up on Street.

Solomon Budio, 86 years old, who was sent to Minneapolis last week seemingly because he was in the way at his home in Winnebago City, died at the city hospital yesterday afternoon.

Budio said his relatives put him on a train bound for the twin cities and told him to go to the Little Sisters of the Poor in St. Paul where he would receive free treatment for his disease. He was picked up on Washington avenue by Officer John Long in a semi-conscious condition and was taken to the hospital where he was cared for until his death. His relatives in Winnebago City have been notified.
