THE FIRST DAYS OF THE UNIVERSITY

While contemplating the grand proportions of the University of Minnesota it is almost hard to believe that at one time it did not consider the institutions of sufficient importance to give it the financial assistance that was actually necessary to keep it open. Yet such is the fact. Feb. 13, 1851, the territorial legislature passed a law establishing the University of Minnesota and locating it at the Falls of St. Anthony.

After a long and arduous struggle, the university was opened in 1857. Its completion, however, did not by any means indicate an era of prosperity, inasmuch as from that time until 1867 it was unoccupied. Although annual sessions of the legislature were held during all those years, the university was not considered of sufficient importance to warrant any large expenditure of state funds.
