ALL CUT AND DRIED

Hearst to Have Support of Iowa Democrats in His Presidential Aspirations.

In Return He Is to Spend Thousands Boosting Mr. Sullivan's Campaign.

Des Moines, Iowa, Oct. 15.—The leading democrats of Iowa are pledged to support William Randolph Hearst of Chicago as democratic candidate for president of the United States.

The support is the price of the interest which Mr. Hearst has promised to take in the state campaign this fall. In consideration of the work which he will do for Iowa democrats in his newspaper, the American, he is to receive the support of such men as Chairman Jackson of the state central committee, J. B. Sullivan, candidate for governor, George I. Huffman, former state chairman, and other leaders.

William J. Bryan had wind of the plan and dropped out of Des Moines night before last. He came from New York, where he was at the ship's side ready to start on his European tour. His visit was short. Immediately after it was announced that the deal with Hearst to flood Iowa with democratic daily papers every day during the fall campaign had been closed, and further, that Mr. Bryan had decided to return to New York and take his ship to Europe. That Bryan has lost the support of Iowa for the presidency, and that he cannot even control it for any one else, is conceded. It is said in some quarters, however, that Bryan urged the deal with Hearst and that its consummation is really a Bryan victory, instead of a Bryan defeat.

THE FRIARS' LANDS

Mixed Commission May Be Appointed to Appraise Them. New York Sun Special Service. Washington, Oct. 16.—A proposition is now under consideration at the war department to appoint a mixed commission to settle the friar and question in the Philippines. This proposal was advanced by the insular commission, and while it is being considered in a general way, it is probable that the retirement representatives of the friars and the United States government will be appointed.

Little progress has been made toward acquiring the friars' lands, and for some time negotiations have been at a standstill. The friars are placing obstacles in the way of the settlement of this important question. They are unwilling to give up their lands, although they will be forced to do so eventually. To this commission will be referred the question of the amount to be paid for the lands and other questions concerning the retirement of the friars from the archipelago and their relations to the people.

WILL CONSULT TAMS

Bonaparte Will Quiz Him About Dawes Commission Affairs. New York Sun Special Service. Washington, Oct. 16.—Charles J. Bonaparte of Baltimore had a conference yesterday with the secretary of the interior concerning the investigation he is making into the charges against federal officeholders in Indian Territory. After the interview Mr. Bonaparte said he expected to have a conference with Chairman Bixby of the Dawes commission, who will visit Washington soon on official business. He also said that he expected to visit Indian Territory in pursuit of the inquiry with which he has been intrusted.

DEVONSHIRE AS LEADER

The Edinburgh Review Proposes Him to Free Traders. London, Oct. 16.—The Edinburgh Review, which is edited by Arthur Elliott, who resigned the financial secretaryship of the treasury because of his difference with Mr. Balfour on the fiscal question, to-day makes a strong appeal for a reorganized liberal unionist party under the leadership of the Duke of Devonshire and to include men of all parties devoted to free trade, like Mr. Ritchie and John Burns. It invites the assistance of the independent labor party also.
