

THEY CAME TO SCOFF

"Elijah" Dowie Sternly Rebukes His Congregation at Madison Square Garden, New York.

Says His Service Is Not a "Buffalo Bill" Show, but Deserves Respectful Treatment.

New York, Oct. 19.—Five thousand persons were turned away from Madison Square Garden yesterday afternoon after all the seats in the building had been filled with a great crowd curious to see John Alexander Dowie on his first appearance before a New York audience. Fully 14,000 persons were in the garden at 2:30 o'clock, when the services began with the professional, in which the Zion white-robed choir, to the number of about 600, and the capped and gowned ordained officers of the Christian Catholic church in Zion took part.

The procession ascended to the platform, where the choir took position behind the pulpit and the officers occupied the places at the sides. When those on the platform had taken their places Dr. Dowie ascended the platform, accompanied by Overseers Daniel Bryant, J. G. Excell, A. J. G. Dowie, J. G. Speigner, G. L. Mason and W. H. Fisher, who took their places behind the pulpit in the order in which they had ascended the rostrum.

Dr. Dowie wore the usual white robe with a black sash over it. The service of prayer opened with the invocation by Dr. Dowie, followed by the singing of a hymn, during which the crowd continued to pour into the garden. This was followed by the recital of the creed and commandments and the reading of scripture, during which hundreds of persons started to leave the hall, causing much confusion. The exodus continued in spite of repeated orders to close the doors, until nearly a third of the audience had departed, but many of the vacant seats were filled with the waiting crowd outside.

After order had been somewhat restored, Dr. Dowie said: "If this is New York and this is a typical New York congregation, I am in the face of a new experience. I think that some of the people who came in must have thought this was a Buffalo Bill show. I wonder if the congregations of the churches here enter and leave as they please. I reckon we have learned something and will be prepared hereafter. There will be no more going out of the front door. If any have remained outside let them in. It seems a shame they should not have the seats' the Buffalo Bill persons have left."

STRIKERS ENJOINED

Must Not Intimidate New Men Employed by Express Companies.

Sherman, Tex., Oct. 19.—An injunction against striking employees of the Pacific Express company and their associates has been granted in the United States court here, and an order has been issued to the enjoined men to desist from intimidating or using violence to prevent other employees of the company from performing their duties at Texarkana, Marshall or Longview.

President F. E. Modie of the Brotherhood of Railway Expressmen has stated it had been reported to him that on some of the runs where the Pacific Express company has contracted with the railway companies to handle the baggage, brakemen and baggagemen, members of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, have been pressed into service to handle the baggage, and that it is working harm to the employees of the company, who are demanding an increase in salary.

WARSHIP BEACHED

The Prince George, B. R. N., Seriously Injured in a Collision.

Ferrol, Spain, Oct. 19.—The British battleship Prince George, which was towed here yesterday after having been in collision with the British battleship Hannibal during the naval maneuvers at Cape Finisterre, was found to be so extensively damaged by the Hannibal's ram that she has been beached for temporary repairs, preparatory to being towed back to England, where she will be placed in dry dock. The Prince George took in immense quantities of water, necessitating incessant pumping.

CALL ON THE KING

Members of Alaskan Boundary Court See King Edward.

London, Oct. 19.—After a brief secret session this morning the Alaskan boundary commission members at Buckingham palace, where they were received by King Edward.

Ambassador Choate accompanied the United States commissioners and introduced them to the king, who had previously been informed of the agreement reached by the tribunal.

MAY COME HERE

Move On Foot to Induce Immigration of Macedonian Refugees.

Sofia, Oct. 19.—One class of Bulgarian Reservists to the number of 5,000 is to be disbanded; if Turkey follows suit other classes will be disbanded. It is reported here that a lively agitation is on foot to induce the Macedonian refugees to emigrate to the United States.

SAID IT ALL AND MORE

Prof. Bradshaw Says the Bryan Interview Was Absolutely as He Reported It.

Special to The Journal. Iowa City, Oct. 19.—"Had I dropped free silver in 1896 I would have been elected president," William J. Bryan. This quotation from the erstwhile apostle of 16 to 1 is vouched for as authentic by Professor W. J. Bradshaw of the Iowa Commercial college, who was called upon to verify his statement that Mr. Bryan, in an interview with him had declared the silver issue dead.

This addition to his previous statement regarding his talk with Mr. Bryan was called forth from Professor Bradshaw by the wide publicity given to denials by the Nebraska man that he had admitted that free silver was dead or would not be a prominent issue before the national democratic convention. Professor Bradshaw, who for years has been an intimate friend of Mr. Bryan, is much annoyed at the question of his veracity, and he wants vindication. He reiterates his statements regarding a conversation with Mr. Bryan during a recent railway trip, and says his quotations from Mr. Bryan's remarks were absolutely correct. The further statement by Mr. Bryan that it is his belief he would now occupy the presidential chair had he let the silver issue drop three years ago, Professor Bradshaw neglected to mention in his previous interview. Now he wants the public to know the facts, and he insists the words uttered by him on the subject are correct.

DEMANDS AN INDICTMENT

London Official Asks for a True Bill Against Whitaker Wright.

London, Oct. 19.—The recorder, in charging the grand jury at the Old Bailey today, advised finding a true bill against Whitaker Wright, the company promoter who was extradited from New York July 22 to answer charges growing out of the failure of the London & Globe Finance corporation, limited. Commenting on the "noble directorate," including the late Marquis of Dufferin, associated with Wright, the recorder said he hoped the facts which had been disclosed would serve as a solemn warning to persons of high position regarding lending their names to commercial enterprises of which they had no practical knowledge and in which they became the prey of wicked men who, by means of their names, victimized the public.

THEY ARE REMARRIED

Wed Twenty Years Ago, but No Record Was Made.

New York, Oct. 19.—Altho they were lawfully married by a priest twenty-one years ago in Newark and have raised a large family, Cesare Pinzelli, a prosperous fruit dealer, and his wife have found it necessary to remarry. The second ceremony was made necessary by failure to have the one twenty-one years ago duly recorded in the office of the city clerk. There was consequently a lack of evidence demanded by the Italian government before a legacy of \$50,000 can be given to a daughter of the couple.

WANTS A DIVORCE

The Fourth Mrs. Wickes Is Unhappy With Millionaire Spouse.

Chicago, Oct. 19.—Thomas H. Wickes, vice president of the Pullman company, is again involved in matrimonial difficulties by a lack of evidence demanded by the Italian government before a legacy of \$50,000 can be given to a daughter of the couple. The fourth Mrs. Wickes is unhappy with her millionaire spouse. She is said to be hiding with friends on the South Side. Whether or not Mr. Wickes will again sue for a divorce, with his fourth wife as an opponent, will depend largely upon the decision of his attorney.

CRITICISES "SOCIETY"

Newport Pastor Alms a Sermon at the Wealthy Cottagers.

Newport, R. I., Oct. 19.—Some of the alleged evils of society have been held up to the view of a large audience here in Emmanuel church by Rev. Dr. E. H. Porter. The church is in the heart of the cottage colony, and many of the fashionable cottagers are included in its membership. "The demons of society," said he, "are intemperance, impurity, dishonesty, gambling, bribery, perjury and divorce; rottenness in our civilization. Our days may be no worse than other days, but they are bad enough. We ask ourselves if Christ's teachings and influence are waning with the increasing centuries of time. Why cannot society cast out its own evils?" "There are many in society who lament and deplore these evils, but society on the whole does not care enough about its evils to seek to cast them out. Some day it will."

CAN CULTIVATE RUBBER

Agricultural Department Says Idea That It Can't Be Done Is Nonsense.

New York Sun Special Service. San Francisco, Oct. 19.—Andrew Cook of the botanical department of the department of agriculture has decided after an exhaustive inquiry that enough rubber can be secured from the Philippines and Porto Rico to supply the whole of the United States. Last year the importation amounted to nearly \$29,000,000. Mr. Cook has just returned from Guatemala, Porto Rico, South America and the Philippines.

After a few amateur experiments it had been decided that rubber trees could not be planted and cultivated except under savage hands from which we derive our supply. Mr. Cook says the rubber tree can be cultivated. He says the success of the rubber planter is assured, and the statement that rubber cultivation is experimental is absurd. The starting of rubber plantations by untried growers is discouraged by Mr. Cook, but he says the difficulties in the way of rubber cultivation may easily be overcome without great loss of capital.

Some land in the southern part of Porto Rico is recommended as being adapted to rubber culture, and experiments will be made there. If successful other land which is too low and too much exposed for coffee cultivation can be made profitable. A low grade gutta percha has been received from the Philippines and Mr. Cook believes rubber can be cultivated there. It requires eight years before trees can be tapped for a yield of rubber.

LOOKING FOR CLERGYMEN

Bishop Mann Is in the East for That purpose.

New York, Oct. 19.—In the course of a sermon delivered in Calvary church, Episcopal church the Rt. Rev. Cameron Mann, Protestant Episcopal missionary bishop of North Dakota, has declared that while there are no candidates for the office regarding the change of its name, "there are few who do not wish her to become American in the truest meaning of the word." Bishop Mann is in the east to raise \$10,000 to carry on his work in North Dakota this winter and incidentally to secure twenty or more young clergymen for his missionary fields.

Streberville, Ohio—Charles Jordan and Miss Austa Reese stepped off a train in front of another and were killed.

Harrisburg, Pa.—The Middleton Iron and Tube works to-day laid off 250 men because of lack of orders. The works employ about 800 men.

Cincinnati—Secretary Matre of the Catholic Federation has received a cablegram conveying the apostolic blessing from the pope to the federation.

Renov, Nev.—Colonel J. D. Powers of Louisville, Ky., who has been in the city for some time, managed to roll out of the way, and died with severe injuries.

Chicago—A. J. Mundy, manager of the Electric Protective company, and the National Automatic Fire Alarm company, has been arrested, charged with embezzling \$100,000.

Cincinnati—In the trial of D. V. Miller and J. M. Johns on charge of conspiracy to extort a bribe from postal department officials, the jury disagreed and was discharged.

San Francisco—A ferry boat collision in the middle of the Cook county courts, with his passengers. Both boats were damaged, but reached their slips safely. No one was hurt.

New York—Brooklyn destroyed several large planing mills, lumber yards and carriage shops and caused a loss estimated at more than \$200,000.

Milwaukee—Milwaukee's new revenue cutter has left for Cleveland. The part in the settlement of the international dispute which has arisen between the United States and Canada over the fishing in Lake Erie.
