## HAS A PAIR OF LEGAL WIVES

The a Bigamist Max Graber Is Not Guilty Under the Law.

Trouble Arose Thru an Ecclesiastical Divorce Granted by the Jewish Church.

**New York Sun Special Service.**

Chicago, Oct. 28.—Judge Holden has decided Max Graber to be the husband of two women—a legal bigamist. By grace of the courts of Cook county, Graber is the rightful husband of two women, the legal head of two separate and distinct establishments, in each of which he sheltered a legal wife.

"I am a bigamist, yes; but what fault can my neighbors find with that?" he asks. "And what can either of my wives say to disturb me? I am living within the law. I am doing no wrong."

Max Graber married Sarah Graber in Russia Nov. 15, 1885, and lived with her until Jan. 1, 1890. He came to America, and later alleged that his wife was untrue to him. On that ground he secured a Jewish "gett," or ecclesiastical divorce, and gave it to his wife and then married Lena Levinson.

Three years ago Mrs. Sarah Graber came to this country, and then Graber's troubles began. Mrs. Lena Graber filed a bill for separate maintenance in the circuit court, alleging that her husband was full legally married to Sarah Graber. Judge Gibbons held that Mrs. Lena Graber was not entitled to a divorce.

Then Mrs. Sarah Graber filed a bill for separate maintenance, declaring that the "gett" was invalid, as the ecclesiastical court had no jurisdiction. Judge Holden upheld the woman's contention, and declared she was entitled to separate maintenance on the ground of desertion. The decree was entered to-day by Judge Holden and provided that Graber shall pay his wife \$5 a week and \$50 solicitor's fees. Graber is waiting for somebody to tell him how to get out of it.

## THE JUDGE WAS FINED

His Honor Was Assessed \$1 for Two Cuss Words, but Didn't Pay.

Camden, N. J., Oct. 28.—Presiding Judge Harrison H. Voorhes of the Cape May circuit court was fined \$1 by Justice Dien of Camden yesterday. The fine represented two cuss words at 50 cents each. A goat which had been used to eat the furniture of a grocery store and had its leg broken by the proprietor was at the bottom of the case. Judge Voorhes, as a lawyer, replied to the groceryman, who was charged with cruelty to animals. The case was called and disposed of before the judge arrived.

"What do you mean by disposing of this case before I arrived?" asked the judge of the magistrate.

"Look here, no judge is a judge; but you are no judge in this court," replied the magistrate.

"Why," exclaimed the judge, "fifty cents each for those oaths," said the magistrate.

"I don't pay," said the judge, and he started to walk out.

"Policeman, arrest that man," said the magistrate.

The policeman and the judge walked away together. The policeman returned, but the judge did not, and the fine is unpaid.
